WHAT WILL THE NEW YEAR BRING FORTH

As this is the last issue of the
Leader for the year 1917, we de-
sire at this time to thank the
people of Lincoln County for
their splendid patronage during
the past year, and especially our
correspondents for the good
work they have done, and to
wish you one and all a happy
and prosperous year 1918.

During the year just ending
Toledo and Lincoln County have
not prospered as they should in
a business way, and many of our
people have had to go elsewhere
to earn a livelihood.

The prospects for 1918 look
fairly bright, and it is hoped that
we will have work in plenty for
all who have left. At this time
it looks as if the sawmill and
logging camps would be working
full time, before many weeks.

The Ports of Toledo and New-
port are expecting to let the con-
tract for the building of the
South Jetty, on the 2d of Janu-
ary. If this work brings the
prosperity that is hoped and ex-
pected, Lincoln county will be a
lively place indeed.

The new sawmill of the Pioneer
Lumber Company is now
ready for operation, that of
Hawkins Bros. at Elk City is
running full time, and the new
mill on the Lower Siletz will be
operating within a month. There
are prospects for the locating of
a small mill here at Toledo which
we hope to see materialize dur-
ing the coming year.

Lincoln county has wonderful
resources and should be one of
the banner counties of the state.
We are slowly forging ahead
with our dairying, goat and
sheep raising, and small fruits,
and with the advent of good
roads Lincoln county will be put
on the map with a vengeance.

FAIR REPORT

No doubt the citizens of Lin-
coln County will be pleased to
see a report of my expenses in
behalf of the County at the State
Fair and Mfg. and Land product
Show and what the county has
received in prizes from such
shown together with a few sug-
gestions for showing our coun-
ties products at shows in the fu-
ture.

First there is no better way of
advertising than in showing the
people the actual products and
therefore the counties making
the best exhibits gets the best
advertising. The county fair is
the best place for the exhibitor
to collect his exhibit which
should be started early in the
spring before the fall shows.
Grains and grasses should be
collected at harvest time and
kept in a dark, dry place, hung
with heads down and in bundles
not less than four inches in di-
ameter. Grains should have all
leaves removed from the straws
and both grain and grasses
should be tied with three bands.
No agriculture exhibit should be
too ripe. Potatoes should be ripe
and of an even size and of the
same type. Thirty pounds makes
a nice exhibit and can be shown
in a crate or basket. Thrashed
grain should be shown in glass,
in peck lots, and free from foul
seeds. Eight quart gold fish
bowls make fine containers for
grain and I believe this county
should have a few for that pur-
pose. They cost about \$1.50
each.

Lincoln county can exhibit al-
most every article that any
other county can and several ar-
ticles that other counties can-
not show. Fish and shellfish
must be collected when the sea-
son and tide is favorable so it
is almost impossible to show a
nice exhibit of these without
glass and solution. This is a
little costly in the start but may
be kept indefinitely.

Finance is another great fac-
tor as the counties having the
most money to spend on their
exhibit has a great deal the ad-
vantage of the exhibitor with a
small amount of money. At the
Land Show some counties had
\$800 or \$1000 to spend while
others had only about one third
that amount.

At the State Fair I was order-
ed by the Court to draw \$100
from the bank. The total ex-
pense of collecting and showing
the exhibit was \$123.85. We re-
ceived \$100.00 as third premium
so the actual cost to the county
was only \$23.85.

At the Land Show I started
with \$200.00. The total cost of
collecting and exhibiting at this
show was \$192.46 out of which
we received as refund \$10.97 and
\$150.00 prize. Therefore out of
the \$200.00 expended we received
\$160.97. I received from the
county \$2.50 per day for my time
collecting and showing the ex-
hibit, totaling \$80.00. The total
cost to the county in making
both shows was really only
\$135.34 which placed the exhib-
its before the eyes of over 300,
000 people. This is certainly
the most effective and cheapest
advertising there is and with a
little more time and money Lin-
coln county can make any coun-
ty in the state a hard run for the
blue ribbon or sweepstakes.

Aside from what the county has
received there were four prizes
to individuals from the Land
Show. G. W. Crocker, Blue rib-
bon and \$3.00 for best Gold Coin
potatoes; W. F. Wakefield, Blue
ribbon and \$3.00 for best Early
Freeman potatoes; Jas. Franks,
Blue ribbon and \$3.00 for best
spring wheat; E. T. Raddant,
Red ribbon and \$2.00 for second
best Climax Special oats.

There were other fine exhibits
that all helped the County to a
great extent. Onions from Wil-
lie Jacobson, apples from Wake-
field, McBride, Aldrich and Wel-
tin, canned fruit and vegetables
from Mrs. Boynton and Mrs.
Robbins, butter from Nashville
and Toledo and cheese from
Mewhuter at Otis and vegeta-
bles from all parts of the county
made the exhibit.

I wish to thank all who help-
ed so willingly by sending their
products and also Mr. Parrish
and Mr. Castle who helped col-
lect the exhibit. Hoping you will
all take an interest in the next
Fair, I remain,

DO YOU HAVE TO PAY?

It will require a small army of
men to take the income tax re-
turns of persons subject to the
new law.

Collector of Internal Revenue.

Milton A. Miller, today announc-
ed that fifteen officers will start
from his headquarters on Janu-
ary 1st and on January 2nd
every one of them will be on the
job at the points in the respect-
ive counties as designated, to
meet the people and help them
make their income tax returns.
The officer assigned to this
county is due to arrive here on
the 3rd and to remain until the
15th, both dates inclusive. He
will have his office in the Court
House where he may be found
every day of the dates stated.

"It will be well for every un-
married person whose net in-
come for 1917 is \$1000.00 or
over, and every married person
living with wife or husband
whose net income for 1917 is
\$2,000.00 or over, to call on the
income tax man and learn
whether or not they have any
tax to pay." Collector Miller said
today. "The person subject to
tax who doesn't make return in
the time prescribed is going to
regret it. The Government will
get after all income tax slack-
ers."

"There's hardly a business
man, merchant or professional
man who won't have to make re-
turn of income. Farmers, as a
class, will have to pay the tax.
The safe thing to do is for every
person who had a total income
of \$1,000.00 or \$2,000.00, as the
case may be, and who is not
sure about what deductions the
law allows him, to play it safe by
calling on the income tax man."

"The man sent by the Collec-
tor will have forms for everybody
and persons who expect to call
on him need not trouble them-
selves to write for forms."
