**ALDEN ABBEY DIES "SOMEWHERE" IN FRANCE**

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Abbey, of Elk City, received word the first of the week that their son, Alden, had died of pneumonia, which followed an attack of measles. Alden entered the U. S. Engineering Corps last Summer and in the Fall was sent to France.

Alden Abbey was about 25 years of age and had spent most of his life on the bay, making his home with his parents at Elk City. He was very popular with the younger set, and has many acquaintances here in Toledo. He was a member of the Odd Fellows, belonging to Toledo lodge No. 109. He attained that honor which is the highest that mortal man can attain, he gave his life to his country.

**S. D. JENKINS DIES**

Word was received here Saturday of the death of Sardus D. Jenkins, at the home of Mrs. Mary Fielding, on the Lower Siletz, death occurring on Thursday the 10th, after a lingering illness of several months. Mr. Jenkins was born in Oswego county, N. Y., February 27th, 1842. His wife departed this life Feb. 8, 1913. To their union was born eight children, four having preceded him in death. Three sons and a daughter are left to mourn his loss. Two sons, Frank and Fred, were with him at death. Mr. Jenkins was highly respected by all who knew him. Deceased was a veteran of the Civil War.

**ROLAND K. CHAMBERS DIES WHILE AT LYLE, WASH.**

The sad news was received here last Friday evening of the death of our former townsman, Role Chambers. Role had not been sick and at the time of his death was working with a government surveying crew, as rodmann. The levelman failing to get any response to his signals went to investigate the cause and found that Role had dropped dead. Death being caused by heart failure. He had spent the past summer here with his brother, Fred, and he apparently was in good health, and his sudden death came as a terrible shock to his many friends.

The remains were brought here Monday evening by Fred Chambers, who departed for Lyle, as soon as he heard of his brother's death, and interment was had in the Toledo cemetery Wednesday. The last sad rites being performed by the Masonic lodges of Toledo and Newport.

Roland King Chambers was born in Kings Valley, Oregon, on the 28th day of September, 1871, dying at the age of 46. He spent much of his boyhood here in Toledo, but since reaching manhood has lived in Southern and Eastern Oregon. Deceased was married and leaves five children to mourn his loss, they being: Bernice, Paul, Ramona, Elmo and Anna, three of whom are now attending high school at Corvallis. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. C. G. Copeland of Newport, two brothers, Fred and George, of this city, and three sisters, Mrs. Sadie Davis, of Eureka, Calif., Mrs. Anna Turner of Canton, S. D., and Mrs. Esther Andersen who resides here.

**WANTS BRIDGE LOCATED NEAR TOLEDO**

Toledo, Oregon, Jan. 16th, 1918.

To the Editor:—

The proposed bridge across the Yaquina River near Toledo is an old subject to most of your readers—but is of enough interest to most all of us to cause us to ask questions about it and put forth our ideas on the same, therefore I would like to ask a few questions of your readers or any person who can answer them.

Now the County Court has promised the people that they would build a bridge across the river at or near Toledo, but did not designate the exact location. They left the location of the bridge up to a committee whom they appointed on which committee there was not a member who had had any experience in the locating of a bridge of that magnitude.

This committee so I understand was to obtain right of ways etc., and smooth all the wrinkles out in the job of locating the bridge and get it in such shape that all the Court and their Engineer would have to do would be to build the bridge.

Now I for one believe that this is liable to cause the bridge to be located in a place where the local conditions will not be the best to construct in or the future roads might not lead to this point thereby causing a lot of extra expense in the future.

Question 1.—In building a bridge at Mill Creek would it not be necessary to construct a high trestle from a point near Mr. Darnley's house to a point on the hill above the railroad track, making an overhead crossing at the railroad, also the building of a trestle 40 feet or more high across the full distance?

2.—Will the War Department not cause a high span or movable span to be put in at the river?

3.—Do not the new roads as laid out, all come out on top of the hill above Mr. Darnley's house, except the proposed river road from Elk City?

4.—Would it not be necessary to build about 2 miles of new road to connect to the end of the Olalla road and would not this new road have to build on a side hill all the way to Olalla, thereby making it a hard road to drain and keep up caused by the large hill side above and the track below?

5.—How can the grade known as the Gaither hill on the Olalla road be improved as is this not, just a thirty foot ridge of way with a 12 per cent grade or more.

6.—Will the Olalla bridge have to be rebuilt to stand under the heavier traffic.

7.—What is the grade of the street running from Hill street to a point one block north of the school house, as this is the street that is will be necessary to travel to get out of town? It looks pretty steep now and I do not see where it can be improved any.

8.—Is not the road from the conjunction of the roads above Mr. Darnley's place to the proposed site at Mr. Butler's along the top of a almost level ridge, and an almost ideal place to build a road?

9.—Where is the saving of money coming in at, when in building the bridge at Mill Creek it is necessary to build almost 2 miles of new side hill road, improve another mile of old road rebuild a bridge—only to land at the foot of another steep hill with the realization that you have come the longest way that a road could be built from Mill creek, and that you are still on the wrong side of a steep and high ridge—the ridge that our town of Toledo is built on. Is this fair to the Farmer who wishes to haul his produce to town or any one traveling this road?

10.—Has there ever been any estimate made on the difference in cost between the Mill creek crossing and the Butler crossing by a person competent to do so, who took into consideration all the roads, etc, leading to the bridge at the present time or that will lead there in the future? And the cost of constructing the road to the bridge?

11.—Have the people of Toledo ever taken any action on this bridge location in their City Council or Commercial Club?

I am in favor of the location of the bridge at the place known as the Butler crossing, running thence to the railroad and following the railroad on the river side, past the creamery to the crossing in front of the Ellsworth Hotel at the Foot of Hill street, thereby effecting a grade
