LINCOLN CO. COYOTE CLUB

The Harlan Coyote Club will hereafter be known as the Lincoln County Coyote Club and its boundaries have been extended to take in the whole county.

The above mentioned Club was formed by a few of the small stock owners and their friends, residing in the Big Elk and Little Elk valleys; and has during its short life, done an immense amount of good, by encouraging the hunting of Coyotes and other wild animals, such as wild cats, bear and even cougar, which are becoming, in fact have already become a real source of danger to the goat and sheep owners of this county.

The Club deserves the hearty support of every one in the county, more especially the owners of small stock; and makes this appeal to everyone who has the good of the county and its industries at heart, to join with it in an effort to clear the county of one of its worst enemies, one which if let go on increasing, will in a few years, cause such a large annual loss that it will be no longer profitable to raise sheep or goats. The wool and mohair industry, which with the lambs and mutton sales brings in a cash income of approximately \$100,000.00 (One Hundred Thousand Dollars) annually, most of which is spent at home, is surely worth an effort to keep it here. It is an industry for which the county is by nature peculiarly well suited and in fact there are thousands of acres which can only be used for goat pasture, and can thereby be made to bring in an income, which without goats would be practically worthless, and would be a burden instead of an asset, and as sure as we live, if we let the coyotes go on increasing at their present rate, the goat raisers will have to go out of the business and their land will be added to the already large percentage of land owned by absentee landlords and will be, in a few years not even good goat pasture, so act now, join the L. C. C. and help the country to conserve its mohair, wool and mutton—stop the annual loss, which is enormous in this district alone (Big, Little Elk). There has been killed since last spring, sheep and goats valued at \$1500.00—(Fifteen Hundred Dollars). Some owners have lost as high as thirty per cent of their herds. We can if we will stop that loss, but it can't be done by a few, it needs county-wide co-operation, it needs every goat and sheep owner in the county to get together and help stamp out or I should say, kill off every coyote, bear and wild cat in the county. If you don't hunt yourself, help to pay the bounty and make it work while for those who do hunt, and don't forget, that the dollar it costs to hunt, may save you a hundred dollars next shearing time. So invest a dollar now, it will be money well spent and you will get a higher rate of interest in stock saved than can be got from any other investment. The Club has no paid officers and no expenses other than postage, etc. The money taken in is all devoted to the paying of the \$25.00 (Twenty-Five Dollar Bounty) paid on coyotes. No bounty is paid on coyote pups or other animals; pups to be over two months old before a bounty will be paid on them. No bounty will be paid to any one who is not a member in good standing. A member to be in good standing must have paid the entrance fee of one dollar and all assessments levied since January 1 1918. The Club has the support of the Lincoln Co. Court which guarantees half of each bounty. Applications may be made to W. F. Wakefield, Eddyville; Ed. Mauch, Eddyville; I. R. Payne, or T. Thomson, Harlan. Applications should be accompanied by your name and address and one dollar, when a membership card and copy of the rules be forwarded. There is no time like the present and bear in mind that procrastination is not only the thief of time but is also the thief of goats and sheep as well where the coyote is concerned.

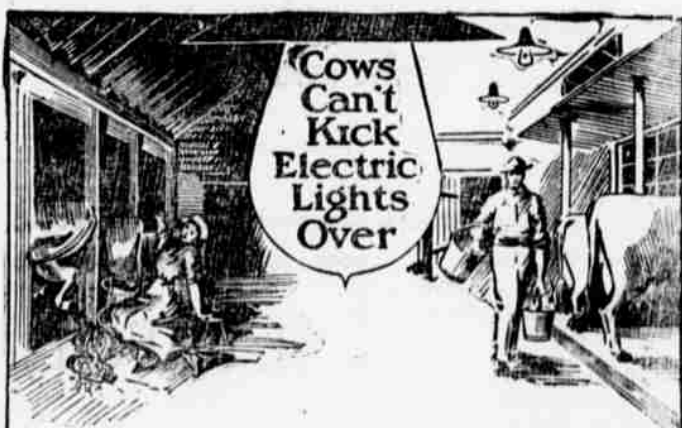
