A LETTER FROM THE TRAINING CAMP

U. S. N. Training Camp, San Diego, Cal.

Dear Mother:—

Uncle Sam gave all his boys here a very Merry Xmas. Here is a routine starting Christmas Eve. Christmas Eve we had a swell big tree decorated with colored lights. Before the presents were given out we had singing and music by the Station Orchestra then Old Santa Clause came in (Santa was a big fat Chief Petty Officer and he made a good one) riding on a small field gun mounted on wheels. It was a surprise to all of us boys 'cause we never even expected a tree much less a Santa that would about "Merry Christmas to you all" and hand out real presents. All the presents were sent to us by the Red Cross from all over the country, each boy received one large package filled with candy, cookies, tobacco, pipe, cigarettes, a toy whistle or rattle, pencil and paper, woolen socks, handkerchief, and some of them had more than that. It was quite a task to give out these presents to the (2200) twenty-two hundred sailors, that are here now, as every fellow had his own name written on his package so that to get each fellow his right package it was a hard job, but they did it handsomely, that ended our Christmas Eve.

Christmas morning we were all awakened by some of the sweetest music, (I believe I ever heard) at 5:30 A. M. or there about, I awoke as tho' in a dream and listened. I tho't I was in heaven because I never heard any thing that sounded so celestial before. But the singing came from four mortals singing "Silent Night, Holy Night" but the volume they put in it seemed impossible to come from any human voice. The quartet was from the First Presbyterian Church of San Diego. While they sang with such blending harmony swelling from double piano into double forte with beautiful crescendo effect. Everything else seemed dead, I really believe there was a one that never held his breath or rather never breathed, even when they stopped singing there was no noise just a letting out of breath or the taking in of mind. You would have tho't every one was asleep, but after a little we began to come out of the spell or dream we were in. I don't believe there was a one that never heard it and I am sure they enjoyed that little morning singing a thousand times more than any other thing could have been enjoyed. It was the awakening from a deep sleep by sweet music that caused it to sound so celestial. I have tried to show you just how I felt is the reason for the detailed explanation. At nine o'clock the band gave a concert and they had races and other games for prizes which took up most all the morning. At 12:30 we had a swell dinner, that is all—wasn't that enough? 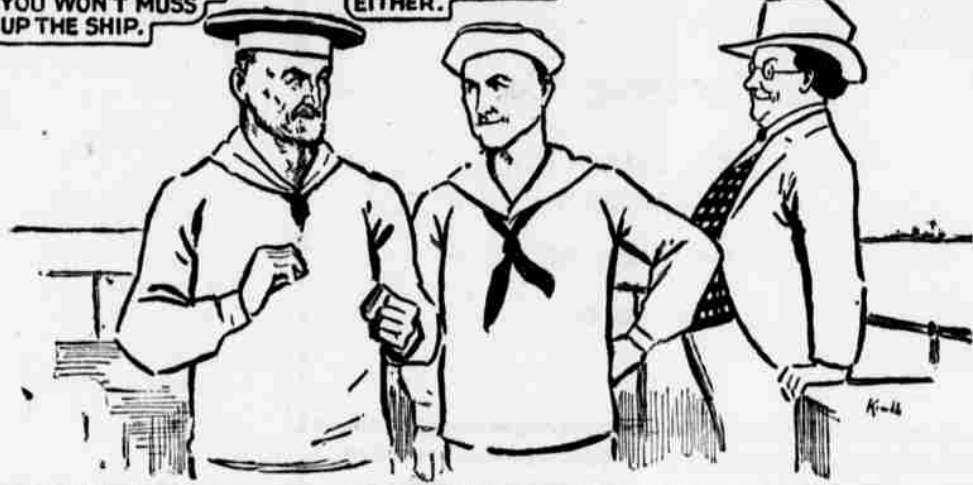

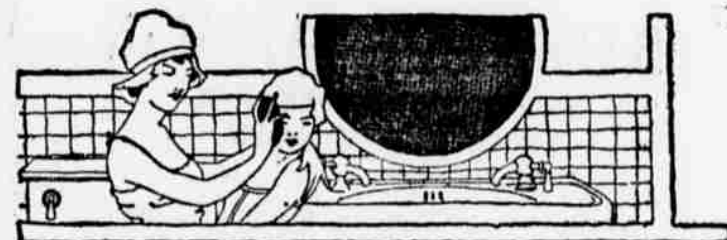

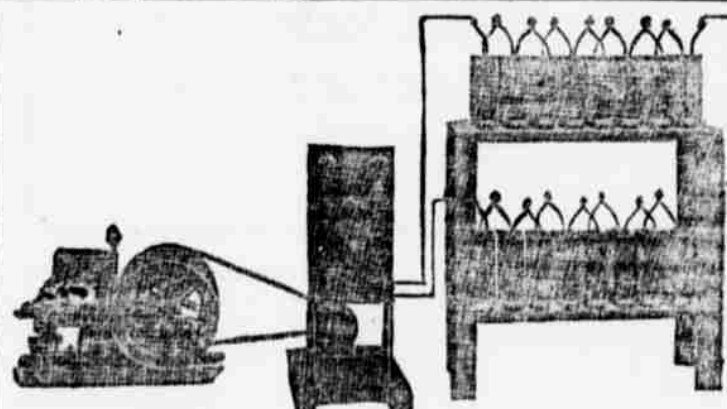
