EVERETT BROWN WRITES

Randall, Minn.,
Jan. 13, -9-8.

Dear Folks:—

We are in Minnesota and still going east. We are about ten hours late—will get into St. Paul about six o'clock tonight and Chicago some time tomorrow. We will have to transfer there to the Michigan Central Railway. It is two miles between depots.

Snow, snow, that is all we have seen since we got up last Friday morning. We have been running late all along and missed all the prettiest sights, the boys say. We left Vancouver Thursday at 7:40 p. m. and we were to get into Spokane at 6:50 a. m. but did not get there till 9:50, just three hours late and number 2 train we were to take from there to Chicago was five hours late and then we had to stay there till 3:30 p. m. Before we could leave. We ran into snow about seventy-five miles out from Spokane and as quick as we could after we got there we went to the Millionaire Club and got coffee and eats and another before we left. All we could see before we got there was grass and lava rock but could not see much as it was snowing hard. Saturday morning when we got up we were in Montana and had almost crossed the Rocky Mountains and talk about cold it beat anything I ever saw. We all get off every time they change engineers. But we run from the car to the depot for coffee and from there back to the car. One place we got off we were told it was 32 below zero and you ought to have seen us soldiers go for the car. (There are nine of us to go to Chicago.) But we found out later that they were stringing us to see us run which we sure did. We got off at Glendive, Mont., last night and asked how cold it was and the fellow said it wasn't cold now, it's only ten below zero. One of the boys said he did not want to be there when it was cold. There is so much frost on the windows we can hardly see out. I would not live in Montana, South Dakota or Minnesota for nothing in the world. No fences and the wagon roads run across fields and you have to look close or you don't see the roads at all. No barns to speak of. The hay is stacked in the field and all the stock is out eating hay off the ground. We are afraid we can't get out of Chicago tomorrow as the snow is two feet deep there and yesterday there were no trains running out of there.

We got off every time we can and get something to eat as hardtack, corn beef, pork and beans gets tiresome. From Chicago we go to Detroit, Michigan, and cross over into Canada between Lake Huron and Lake Erie and cross back between Lake Erie and Lake Ontario some place by the Niagara falls to Buffalo, N. Y. From there to Albany, N. Y., then to Worcester, Mass. From there to Ayer, Mass. I don't know how far Ayer is from Camp Devens but I hope it is close. Last night I slept pretty good before that I could not sleep much. Before we get to Camp Devens if I counted right we will have passed through eleven states: Wash., Idaho, Mont., N. Dak., Minn., Wis., into Ill., a little and I do not know whether we get into Ind. or not but it looks like it. We cross Mich. and take a hike into Canada and go across New York and into Mass. then we are home.

This cold weather is going to be hard on us and if we lay over in Chicago on account of the storm we will be out of money. Everything is so high. Two bits for a shave in Spokane, Wash. Montana apples are two for fifteen cents. Fargo, N. Dak., we got a cup of coffee and three hard little doughnuts for twenty cents—how is that. In Montana the boys went into a saloon and asked the bartender to sell them a drink. Nothing doing. Then they wanted him to give them a drink and he would not do it. But he said they could have all the smell they wanted for nothing. Well it is almost four o'clock now. I have turned my watch up twice, an hour each time. The last winter or two I did not like Lincoln county on account of the snow but if I ever get back I think I will be satisfied for some time. My bunch wishes they were back and also the other bunch of four that is going to New Jersey all wishing they were in Portland.

Well I must close now. I suppose you were surprised to hear of me leaving Vancouver, I was I know. We all have colds but are all well besides that. I wish you all were with me but of course you can't. I guess this trip would be all right in the summer time but not much good now. Did you get the telegram I sent you the next day or was the telephone lines down so you couldn't. The day I left Vancouver I got a letter from you folks and one from Aletha but the way things are now I don't know when I

will be able to hear from anyone again. Somebody will have to read this letter to Pop if they can make it out as I am on the train and it jumps around every little bit. Hope this finds everybody well.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Toledo contemplates the improvement of certain streets within the City of Toledo, the cost thereof to be borne by adjacent property owners as provided by section 42 and 43 of the City Charter, as follows:

Hill Street between a point 50 feet South of the South side of the intersection thereof with 7th Street and a point 100 feet North of the North side of the intersection thereof with 7th Street, a side walk 8 feet wide to be constructed on the West side of said street on the official grade of said street, the decking of said side walk to be 2 inches thick and 8 inches wide securely spiked to stringers three in number 2 inches thick and 6 inches wide.

This notice is given by the order of the Common Council of the City of Toledo, which order was made and entered on the 15th day of February, 1918, and is published in the Lincoln County Leader for 3 successive and consecutive issues, beginning with the issue of February 23d, 1918 and ending with the issue of March 8th, 1918. Within ten days from the final publication of this notice any owner of property adjacent to said street to be so improved, who objects to said improvement shall file with the Recorder a written remonstrance against the proposed improvement.
