WHAT LINCOLN COUNTY FARMERS ARE DOING

For 20 and odd years I have been interested in the progress of our farmers and I am glad to note that they are adopting as a primary article in their faith that they must work out their own salvation—that the Lord not only loves a cheerful giver but will help those who help themselves. Probably there is no calling in which this creed is more fully exemplified than farming. I have devoted a little time this past season in watching my neighbor Will Simpson, one of the youngest of our dairy farmers. I have noticed that he was getting a little stooped shouldered wheeling his numerous cream cans from his barn to the depot, and I wondered whether he was performing the stunt just for his health, to develop his muscles or whether the almighty dollar was the real stimulus. One day when he appeared to be in an amiable frame of mind I held him up. Under the pretense of getting the facts in regard to his income tax I ascertained the following: Dairying is his principal business; he keeps from 8 to 10 cows. These cows are mostly grade Jerseys. During the past year the number milked run from 4 to 10, averaging about 8. The milking season was from Feb. 1 1917 to Feb. 1 1918; the test run from 30 to 36. He shipped 131 cans—5240 lbs. of cream. His smallest cream check was \$20. and the largest one was \$102.19. This was for the month of November from 10 cows without any grain feed. The cows run in pasture and fed hay. This shows that it is not necessary to feed a large amount of grain to your cows. The largest shipment of cream was in July, 648 lbs., produced from 8 cows. No grain was fed. These figures do not include a liberal amount used in his family in which are growing children who have a partiality for milk and cream. The cream test run from 30 to 36. The cream sold \$700. Added to this should be the by products, the calves and the food value to hens, pigs, etc. Combined, the products of his dairy make up a neat little income.

When our County Agricultural Agent comes over to take up his work here he would do well, to stake down near Will and watch him do things; for if ever he should go into business on his own hook he might learn something that will be of benefit to him. Will thinks that he can make his dairy pay him still better this year than it did last year; he has purchased a 10 x 24 Cameron Silo and will install it this season.

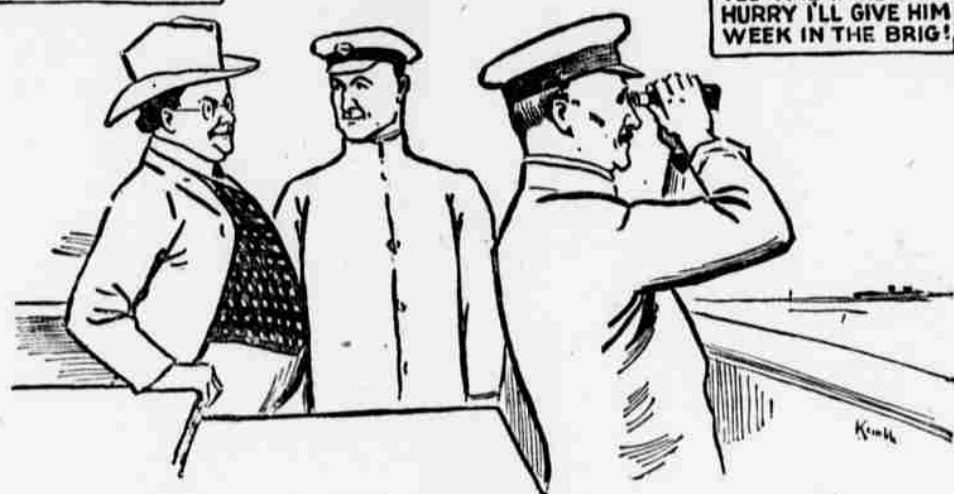
