NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Toledo contemplates the improvement of certain streets within the City of Toledo, the cost thereof to be borne by adjacent property owners as provided by section 42 and 43 of the City Charter, as follows:

Hill Street between a point 50 feet South of the South side of the intersection thereof with 7th Street and a point 100 feet North of the North side

of the intersection thereof with 7th Street, a side walk 6 feet wide to be constructed on the West side of said street on the official grade of said street, the decking of said side walk to be 2 inches thick and 8 inches wide securely spiked to stringers three in number 2 inches thick and 6 inches wide.

This notice is given by the order of the Common Council of the City of Toledo, which order was made and entered on the 18th day of February, 1918, and is published in the Lincoln County Leader for 3 successive and consecutive issues, beginning with the issue of February 22d, 1918 and ending with the issue of March 8th, 1918. Within ten days from the final publication of this notice any owner of property adjacent to said street to be so improved, who objects to said improvement shall file with the Recorder a written remonstrance against the proposed improvement.

GRANGE NEWS

Eddyville, Oregon, March 7, 1918. Editor Leader:—

I will try and let your readers know how the granges in Lincoln county are getting along and what they are doing.

First I will say the Granges throughout the county are all holding their own, some have not gained much in membership, some have fallen off in number, while others have gained enough to make up. We still have eight granges and all are looking forward to better times.

Elk City grange has 46 members in good standing, have the ground paid for and will build a new hall this summer.

Big Elk Grange has 50 members in good standing and is situated in one of the finest valleys in the county and the people are prosperous. Big Elk grange has the brightest future in regard to membership; at the meeting when the officers were installed there were 24 babies present under 3 years old—this would look good to Teddy Roosevelt.

Toledo grange with 59 members in good standing and 16 applications on the table at installation. At Toledo they do things at wholesale. They have bought 4 car-loads of flour, feed, seed, grain and other things to numerous to mention.

Siletz Valley grange has 23 members in good standing. This grange is situated in the wonderful Siletz valley where they grow more potatoes to the acre than any other place in Oregon. Now if anyone doubts this come over as we can deliver the spuds. They are going to waste for the want of a market. Siletz valley grange is talking hall and may have a new one this year.

Salmon River grange has 34 members. This is doing well and they have one of the largest halls in the county, have it furnished and paid for which is doing fine taking circumstances into consideration. They are 25 miles from the railroad and on the worst wagon road; and over a high mountain to get to the R. R., but never the less they do things at Salmon River.

Lincoln Grange is the biggest little grange in the county. They have 17 members, have a nice hall all finished and have arranged so they can pay for it at their leisure. The members of this grange deserve a lot of credit for hanging on and waiting for better days, and they are coming soon, too.

Waldport grange is still on the grange map. They have lost lots of members in one way and another but are still doing business at the same old place with 20 members. They have the largest hall in the county. Several of their best members have enlisted and made the grange short of good workers.

Eddyville grange has 37 members. This grange was organized November 1st, 1910 with 22 charter members, they still have 8 of the charter members left. They have initiated 173 and have 37 members left for the first four years they were most all transient but they are making growth now that is more substantial.

While we are trying to keep our heads above water we are doing some good in more ways than one. There are five halls built which are a credit to the communities where they are and had it not been for the granges these improvements would never have made. Several local fairs are being held annually throughout the county and the grange is largely responsible for them. Schools are being helped—roads are being bettered and the grange is helping in every way possible, so let us all get together, work together and talk together so that our county will be better and with a better county we will have a better State of Oregon.

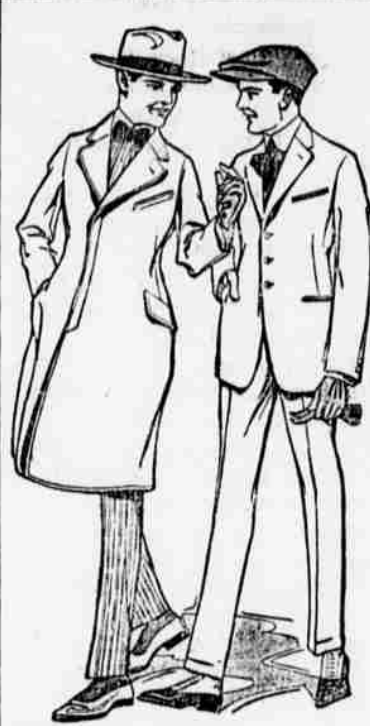
