"WITH THE COLORS"

Camp Green, N. C.

March 7, 1918.

Dear Mother and Dad:—

Have not much to write about but as you have often wanted me to write about what we do and the general run of things I will try and do so.

Since coming to this camp we have received a compliment that makes us all proud of our regiment and the branch of the service we are enlisted in. General Dickman said that this was the finest bunch of men he ever saw and that under the conditions that have been since we came to this camp, Jan. 1 we have done work that was amazing. He also said that as Commander of the 4th Division he will be proud to have us arrive in France as an advance guard of the Division.

The 4th Engineers are at this time supposed to be the crack regiment in the U. S. and for the age of it although I do not know much about such things I think it is marvelous how well we do all the drill and the good spirit of the men as a whole when it comes to hard work and discipline which none of us have ever been use to.

Just now we are preparing to make another move and everyman is hoping that we are on our way to make Kaiser Bill think that Sherman's declaration of "what war was" is a mild description.

During the past week the weather here has been fine and every regiment of the post is taking advantage of it and doing hard drill.

Our's has not much of the infantry drill to do as we are to build roads, bridges and in fact everything to back up or advance a modern army. However we had a few hikes under heavy marching order and of the 1600 men only two fell out and came in with the escort wagon, which is much better than the average. We, however, are not the only pebbles on the mud-hills of N. C. for in my work which carries me all over the camp I see men at hard drill on every parade ground I pass. The infantry is generally doing everything from playing games to getting down the fine points of self defense with a bayonet and what I mean the men who are teaching them are those who have proved themselves worthy on a field of active service. Also the artillery is out with the guns do their part. It is a fine sight to see them run the guns up, which have six to eight horses on each one and leave them in a perfect line ready for action. Occasionally we hear them practicing at their target range a few miles distant.

Just below us there is a battalion of machine gun boys and any time of day we can hear the practicing and it sounds just like tearing a big thick piece of canvas only more so. It seems that those bullets must leave the gun barrel with their noses right up against one another but in reality they are one hundred yards apart.

The bugle for lights out is just going so must quit. Can't kick tho, at having to go to bed for regular hours and regular meals are what go to make up the efficiency of the regular army.
