WITH THE COLORS

Dear Folks:—

I am on guard now and am at the guard house. There are five prisoners in the guard house, they have put on ten guards now instead of four as they have always had. I was out with another guard this evening guarding another prisoner while he was cutting wood and it was an unpleasant job but we are in the war now. We are having a storm now. Say, if any body says that it rains in Oregon tell them it does not—Oregon don't know what rain is, it is a dry state. It did not rain here last night but just let down four inches of water in two hours for we had four inches of ice on the ground this morning which made it very nice about getting out on the drill grounds. There was about \$80 of us lined up together for inspection. It was sure cold on the feet. Two companies of us had our guns and belts. We have our full outfits now and leave in about two weeks. Don't worry if you don't hear from us as our mail will be held up two weeks before we get on the ship but I will try and slip one out if I can. There is a boat out in the river that is nearly stuck in the ice, it is moving one mile an hour and pulling a barge with three flat cars, one box car and one oil car on it and they are struggling out on the barge so you know about how long it is.

We all had a fire drill the other morning and Company B was the first on the place where the fire was supposed to have been. When the alarm was sent in my squad or No. 1, was the nearest to the fire buckets and we got them and was the first in line and led the way our captain in command and when all the other companies got there we had to pour out the water and get some more and we were the first ones to get back.

Asa is out cutting wood today but I was lucky enough to get off.

That boat has moved about forty feet in the last half hour. We are still having cold weather. It rained again night before last and froze as it fell so we had another good coat of ice. I kinda have an idea that some of these mornings we will get up and find long icicles hanging from the sky where the rain froze before it could hit the ground. I am sure glad Oregon is not this way.

I guess we will be out of here before the week is out as we had our first lesson in rolling and carrying our packs this morning.

Asa was on guard last Sunday night and Monday I was in K. P. or on kitchen police washing dishes and scrubbing the floors. Our new captain does not drill us when there is ice on the ground which makes it nice for us as we have been drilling ice or no ice. Some of the cooks overstayed their passes last Sunday night

and he let them go as it was their first time but he said that if they ever did it again there would be things doing around camp and the expression he used I guess they will see that it don't happen again. Yesterday morning it was below zero again. I had on all my wool gloves and then my hands got cold.

I think if you will put your ear on this paper you can hear Co. A yelling for they are leaving this morning. We cannot hear our selves think for the noise they are making. We will go the first of the week if not sooner. They have about a mile and a quarter of road to plank but now have it more than half done. They have about 1000 men working and if they would all work we do the road at home we would have it done by this time. Saturday and Sunday I hewed timbers; Monday and Tuesday forenoon I ran the grindstone. There is a little town about as big as Elk City about a quarter of a mile from where we are working. The first day we worked we were about 60 men short for dinner. It was the same until Monday. I was down after work hours and found a guard posted there but it was after work hours so he did not take down my name. Tuesday there was 16 squads of Co. B went out and the officer said he wanted 16 squads there for dinner and they were all there to.

I just looked over the Leader you sent Asa—he is not here but I opened it just the same. Your son, Charles B. Brown.

Remember the big dance tomorrow evening.
