TAFT HEADS LIST

Never before has there been such a unity of purpose as is now evidenced among the people of our county in their efforts to do, not their bit, but their best. The raising of money for the Red Cross is now accepted as the correct way in which to plan all social affairs, so that there may be plenty of funds with which to purchase materials for the making of surgical dressings and hospital garments and yarn for the knitting of socks, so that the women and girls may spend every spare moment in service for the men here, or in the trenches or on the seas, and the way we are learning to Hooverize our time is simply splendid.
A notable and interesting event of the past week was the Red Cross dinner, dance and social given at Taft, in the French hall, under the efficient management of the Misses Wilda Scott and Ida Garrett, in their usual delightful style, assisted by A. L. French.
Because of the heavy donations of the citizens of Taft the management was enabled to turn over to the Red Cross the handsome sum of \$90.00, the entire expense of the entertainment being only \$7.00. Such is the spirit of Lincoln county today, first in all things patriotic, we still continue to hold our own, and while the Kaiser is sure the Lord is on his side, still he ought not to be anxious to steer his theory up against conditions that have commenced to make a million revolutions a minute and hasn't yet thought of bringing up its reserves. Taft which closed the last drive at the head of the list still continues to occupy the place of honor.
