A LETTER

Dear Leader:

I am highly pleased to note the way Lincoln county is making itself noticed lately.

I greatly miss the nice green hills and the fresh sea breeze. Here one day it is extremely hot and the next it is very cold. Sure is great for the health of a real Oregonian!

Some of these temporary Gov't buildings will be unbearably hot when the summer weather gets to work in earnest.

The Liberty Loan drive here was very spectacular, probably more so than at Toledo or Chitwood at least. Douglas Fairbanks, Charlie Chaplin, Marie Dressler and Mary Pickford were all here parading and making speeches. They were all met with considerable enthusiasm. Regardless of Charles' foolish looks and movements he is a very handsome little chap. While they were all making speeches several aeroplanes were flying over the immense crowds dropping Liberty Loan leaflets and performing thrilling stunts. Later the British "tank" Britannia was here in the interests of the "drive" and made some wonderful performances. It performed one day in a canyon in Rock Creek Park in some thick brush and timber. It climbs hills almost straight up and breaks down trees as big as it could find. I don't blame the Huns for running when a "tank" comes in sight.

Last Friday all the Gov't employees here who had bought Liberty Bonds were in a Liberty Loan parade. The parade started at the foot of the Capitol grounds at the head of Pennsylvania Avenue and marched down the street to the White House, where the crowd of about 60,000 people was thrilled by some wonderful aerial stunts by Miss Ruth Law, the noted lady aviator in her Curtiss plane. The entire route of the parade was lined on both sides of the Avenue by an unbroken mob and all the buildings were filled with people. As the marchers passed the White House, President Wilson reviewed them all from his car. With him were Mrs. Wilson and some of her relatives, and also Ex-president Taft. I was the only one in that 60,000 marchers that kept step.

Washington, D. C. sure didn't reach its quota as soon as Oregon did and that is a credit to the Beaver state.

Anyone from that vicinity that is planning on getting into the Government service here, I would be glad to get in touch with them just as it would be to their advantage, I am sure.
