Proposed increase of 25 per cent in freight and passenger rates under government operation of railroads proves the merits of pleas of utility companies asking increases to save them from bankruptcy. Relief should be speedily granted.

Port Orford—Wharf here to be repaired.

Pendleton—Local phone plant will be enlarged. Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. has authorized installation of two additional sectional switchboards.

Salem—Canneries of Salem expect busy season. Salem-Kings dehydrating plant prepared to fill 1,000,000 tins. 300 persons employed.

Coquille—Contract is let to Anderson & Klockers to build Coos City bridge. Cost \$12,064.50.

Lawmakers, both state and national, must realize that policies which discourage and cripple industries, are monkey wrenches thrown in the cogwheels of our war machinery and whether it be peanut stand or mining company affected, financial resources of nation are cut by just that much.

McMinnville—Dennis Construction Co. awarded contract for constructing two million gallon reservoir and additional pipe line from reservoir to city. Combined cost \$24,904.

Taft—to build docks here soon. Construction to cost about \$6000.

Roseburg—Hotel Umpqua being improved by lobby changes and fittings.

Toledo—Public land to be open. Lincoln county has 14,865 acres of old O. & C. land grant.

Announcement is made by Benjamin Schrage, one of "inner circle" of I. W. W. organization, that national socialist party is now providing funds for defense of accused I. W. W.'s and that kindred organizations have offered financial assistance. Is it any wonder thoughtful citizens over the nation fear the socialist propaganda now being spread under different names.

Oregon leads the entire United States in the number of wooden hulls launched for the Emergency Fleet Corporation, the total in the country being 33 vessels, launched in six districts, while 18 of the number are afloat in Oregon waters. That gives the state three more wooden vessels afloat than the five other districts combined.
