SILETZ

A ball was given Saturday evening in the Larson Hall in honor of the boys who started Monday for Camp Lewis, to take up the matter of training for the battle front in France. Their names are Harley Taylor, Henry and Chas. Goodell, and Andrew Washington. The ball was well attended, a good many coming from a distance. Mr. and Mrs. Robert DePoe furnished the music. A number of soldiers from Camps A, G, and D, were present. Ice cream and cake was served and a general good time was had by all present. You would not think from the cool, quiet way the boys conducted themselves, that a great war was going on, and that they will soon be a part of it. They go to swell the great army that is already in the service. A million American soldiers now in France and the number will be in creased right along. The Huns are being driven back and now the American soldiers occupy 28 miles of the battle front, and the American flag floats on ground once held by the Germans, and the space between the front and Berlin is growing smaller all the time, and it would not be a surprise that the "Yanks" will get Berlin before the Huns get Paris. The Kaiser was asked why he should be so nervous and anxious when God was on his side, yes but the Americans are on the other side. The boys who had been called to the colors were asked to step forward and be introduced. They received a round of applause. Dr. Carter was asked to make a short address as a kind of a send off before starting for the training camp. The boys were in the best of spirits and willing to go. A party of 10 or 12 was made up at Siletz, headed by Grant King, to go over Monday morning to meet the train and see the boys off. The depot platform was crowded with friends, neighbors, sisters, brothers, and fathers and mothers to bid the boys good bye. At Toledo 14 men joined the Siletz boys making 18 in all. The people of Toledo treated them royally. They were given a free ticket to the dance that was gotten up in their honor, and Miss Verne Ross gave them a free ticket to the picture show. Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Fredericks, representing the Embroidery Club, gave them a kit of housekeeping things. These are badly needed when away from home. The Kaiser is beginning to see the writing on the wall. He is losing influence with his own people. The German people by their own conduct have earned the hard name of "Huns and barbarians." This name will cling to them forever. It is already in the history of the world. The military bodies of Germany clamored for war and the Kaiser followed them. Their idea was to blot out civilization and Christianity and rule the world with an iron hand. In this they will fail.

The Grange had their monthly meeting here Saturday. It was well attended by the farmers of Siletz valley. A splendid dinner was served and afterwards a short program was rendered and a good social time was had. The question of the Non-Partisan League was discussed. No decision was given but the sentiment of the grange was decidedly against it as being a benefit to the farmers. Mr. Asbahr, the County Agent, was present and gave a good talk on harmony in the Grange.

The Methodist Church will give an ice cream, coffee and cake social July 2d. A cordial invitation is extended to all to be present.

Andrew Smith, a well known Indian, who was brought on the reservation when a boy, was buried Tuesday, the 25th. He lived for 40 years on the bank of the Siletz river near the Steele bridge. A few weeks before he died he embraced Christianity and joined the Methodist Church and was baptized by Rev. Walter Ross the pastor. From that time on he seemed to be perfectly satisfied. His

funeral—as he desired—was conducted just like white people. His step son, Frederick Freeman, and wife, well to do business people who live in Salem, and Miss Sarah Pierce, a trained nurse who lives in Portland, were present, and had been for more than a week, taking care of Andrew. Frank Carson and wife also attended the funeral from Toledo. Indian is not responsible for his color, but he is responsible for his own future.

Jim Hodges will act as night mill foreman, and Wm. Enos will be night sawyer. Fifty soldiers came in Wednesday evening and are working in the mill. They are quartered in the fair buildings.

Toledo is one of the liveliest places in the state, and will fairly be a bee-hive of industry before the summer is over. At present there are no vacant houses in town, and a number of the larger houses are accommodating two, and in some instances, three families. More houses must be built to take care of our rapidly increasing population.

MILL HAS ACCIDENT

Wednesday afternoon the throttle on the new steam feed at mill became jammed as they were running the carriage back and before it could be released, had shot the carriage clear out of the mill into the mill pond. The setter and dogger both jumped and fortunately neither of them were hurt. The carriage was fixed up yesterday, and the mill is operating full time again.

NEW MILL ASSURED; WORK TO BEGIN AT ONCE

Major Hitchcock, and Captain Welsh, has been here the past several days closing negotiations for the huge government cut-up mill. A satisfactory conclusion has been reached and construction work will be begun at once. The plant will be located on the Ball-Peterson island just across from town. This tract comprises about 65 acres and is one of the finest mill sites on the bay. The new mill will have a capacity of 400,000 feet per day, and it is estimated, will cost a half million dollars to build. The city will at once lay a new 12 inch water main from Mill Creek, to supply this and other mills that may locate here. The government engineers investigated our water supply, and are very much pleased with same. They found a flow of a million and a half gallons each 24 hours, which is sufficient to supply a town of 40,000 people.

HOUSE BURNS

The house of Wm. Hensley, on his farm out on the Pioneer Mt. road, burned to the ground yesterday morning with all its contents. The house was insured with the Oregon Fire Relief, of McMinnville.
