#### A LETTER

Nortons, Ore, June 1, 1918.  
Editor-Lincoln County Leader,

I beg space in your valuable paper to answer an article from Rock Creek items in your last issue, viz.—"We pay our road tax like good little boys and when our roads become impassable we donate the work to fix them." This article un- doubtedly refers to the road that leads from Nortons to Rock Creek (as they mentioned the Yaquina River) which is all in Nashville District except about one-fourth mile which is in the Siletz District.

This road was built, mostly by volunteer work and last year ninety per cent of the money allowed by the County was expended on this road and the last two winters I have sent a man into the Siletz District to fix a bad place. (In Ye Editor's of Rock Creek door yard.)

I have not done as much work on this road this year as I intended on account of the scarcity of labor but the road is very favorable compared with the other roads. As far as the Yaquina road is concerned, last year I donated every dollars worth of work that was done on it and this year I donated \$50.00 worth of work, which I think is more than has been donated by the Rock Creekers in the past ten years.

The roads in this District have been under my supervision most of the time for over a quarter of a Century and I know where and how the work was done.

#### CONVERSION OF LIBERTY BONDS

Liberty bonds of the first and second issues and those obtained by converting bonds of the first issue into 4 per cent bonds can be converted into 4 1/2 per cent Liberty bonds during the six months' period beginning May 9 and ending November 9, 1918. The new bonds will be dated May 9, 1918.

After November 9, 1918, no further rights of conversion will attach to the 4 per cent bonds, either the original bonds of the second loan or those obtained by conversion of bonds of the first loan. All of the 4 1/2 per cent bonds are nonconvertible.

Bonds for conversion may be surrendered at any Federal reserve bank or at the Treasury Department. Registered bonds must be assigned to the Secretary of the Treasury for conversion, but such assignment need not be witnessed.

On conversion of registered bonds registered bonds only will be delivered, neither change of ownership nor change into coupon bonds being permitted.

Coupon bonds, however, may be converted into registered bonds upon request. Coupon bonds must have May 15 or June 15, 1918, coupons detached. Coupon bonds issued from conversion will have only four interest coupons attached, and later may be exchanged for new bonds with the full number of coupons attached.

#### USE POTATOES INSTEAD OF BREAD

Bread Must Be Saved—Potatoes Contain the Same Nutrient.

How many potatoes are you eating? This is a question the Food Administration wants every loyal American to ask himself or herself. Strange as it may seem, the eating of potatoes at this time is a practical war service, according to a recent Food Administration bulletin, which points out that this nation now has a large potato surplus on hand and that this valuable food, unless eaten within the next two months, will be lost through sprouting and rotting. By eating of potatoes liberally, every family can save a substantial amount of other food, particularly of wheat. By eating up the surplus of potatoes the nation will also prevent serious loss to the potato producer, who needs to be encouraged to grow maximum crops during the coming year.

"Domestic science experts have figured that: One ordinary baked potato equals in nourishment one thick slice of wheat bread.

"Potatoes at one and one-half to two cents a pound have more food value than bread at ten cents a loaf.

"Potatoes are healthful. They improve the general tone of the system by their wholesome action on the digestive organs. They are easiest on the stomach of all vegetable foods. They are easy on the kidneys because of the minimum of nitrogen they contain. They are easy on the intestines because of the tenderness and small proportion of their cellulose and the fine division of starch.

"Potatoes are valuable in the diet of the sick. They can be eaten with benefit by people suffering from dyspepsia, anemia, diabetes, Bright's disease, cardiac affections, intestinal troubles, constipation, hyperacidity, arthritis, gout, liver complaints, etc.

"Always serve potatoes with meat," concludes the Food Administration bulletin. "Never serve bread and potatoes."

The firing line is now in your kitchen. Knock out the breadline at your table.

It has been said that the Revolutionary War was won by men fed on hasty pudding, in other words, corn meal mush. Let it be written in history that the winning of the present war was made possible by the United States eating potatoes.

The manner of eating, the time of eating and even the kind of foodstuffs eaten are largely a matter of habit. We do not desire to break ourselves entirely of the habit of eating or life would not prove worth living, but it can be made to prove better worth living if we change some of the habits. Suppose we cure ourselves of the hand-eating habit and see if we do not consume less bread. If you were to put your bread and butter on your plate and eat it with a knife and fork it would reduce the amount of bread eaten at once. In some of the Oriental countries men carry strings of bright red wooden beads that are known as "Conversation beads," and they seem unable to talk unless they have them in their hands to play with and pass from one hand to the other. We seem to need something in our hands at table or we feel the meal is incomplete and that, something is usually bread. Forget this habit and save wheat. If you must continue the hand-eating habit, hold a hot potato.

#### How to Increase World's Bread Ration

With famine creeping through Europe, and every nation struggling to produce enough food to sustain life, the American farmer has a duty that he can not shirk. America must ship food to Europe for our soldiers. America must supply bread to starving peoples. No matter what other crops are raised, more acres should be devoted to bread grains. "Do your bit, Mr. Farmer," says a Food Administration bulletin. "Success depends upon you in this world war."

West Point is on a food-conservation basis, and the health of the cadet corps is better than ever. All bread used is composed of 45 per cent wheat flour, 45 rye, and 10 per cent white bolted grain flour; and many cadets consider it superior to the former white bread. Sugar consumption has been cut down, meatless days and meals are rigidly observed, and the reduced amount of meat has been beneficial to health. A lesson from a reliable source.

#### Taking It From Babies.

"Every ounce of wheat products in excess of six pounds per month that you eat, Mr. American Citizen, is that much literally taken from the mouths of the starving women and children of France," says a Food Administration bulletin. "The armed allies may go without wheat, but these innocents will actually die unless we give them of ours in generous proportion."

Victory bread is received with hearty approval. But don't be satisfied to use it on a wheatless day or at a wheatless meal, because it isn't wheatless.

#### MEN TO GET BETTER MAIL SERVICE NOW

A speedier mail service to the camps of the district is planned under a schedule formulated by the district headquarters and made public Tuesday. A car will leave South Beach every day at 11 o'clock with mail for Camps 5 A, 5 C, 5 D, 5 E, and 5 F, returning with the mail from these camps. Mail for the squadrons near Waldport will be delivered daily by automobile from the Warren Spruce Co. office at Waldport. Mail for the camps in District 7 will be delivered from Newport, and one trip daily will be made to Toledo with mail for the camps in District 3.

#### NEWPORT ASSISTS IN FURNISHING CLUB FOR ENLISTED MEN

A completely equipped Army and Navy club for enlisted men who visit Newport has been made possible through the cooperation of the Newport War Camp Community service and the officers of the district. The former quarters of the Newport Rod and Gun club have been acquired, fitted with sleeping accommodations, equipped with a piano, phonograph, writing materials, books and magazines. An attendant is in charge of the club at all times.

The chairman of the Newport War Camp committee is Mr. C. G. Burton. Plans provide for a weekly dance at the club rooms on Saturday evenings, under the chaperonage of the women of Newport.

#### RED TRIANGLE MAN OUTLINE WORK FOR SPRUCE CAMPS HERE

Plans for the Y. M. C. A. work in the district are being made by T. J. Davis, who has been sent here by the Portland headquarters of the Y. M. C. A. War Council. Representatives will be named for all of the camps and the work organized so that the men will have opportunity to hear good speakers, singers and musicians regularly during the next two or three months.

Mr. Davis has made a tour of the district, sizing up the needs and he promises to have the actual plans worked out within a short time.

#### NOVEL WING DEVICE FOR SPRUCE WORKERS

New collar insignia and new hat

cards for enlisted men and officers of the Spruce Production Division is announced in Memorandum No. 188, issued from the Portland headquarters. The new insignia will apply to members of the Army Air Service. The torch and crossed flags of the Signal Corps will be replaced by a device consisting of a pair of horizontal bronze wings, similar in shape to a colonel's eagle's wings, with a silver two-bladed propeller placed vertically on the wings. The hat cord for enlisted men will be green and black, instead of orange and white, as heretofore.

#### ALIEN SOLDIERS TO BECOME AMERICANS

Alien subjects now serving in the Army can obtain full citizenship now under a recent act of Congress. Application should be made through the squadron commanders, who will make arrangements for the proceedings. In the Yaquina S-Y-A district plans are under way for a naturalization day at Toledo or Newport, at which all aliens in the district who desire to can appear and obtain their final papers. Th commanders of the men will be required to vouch for the loyalty and patriotism of the men.

#### IF THEY ONLY WERE AS FREE WITH PASSES

Under a recent order of Director General of Railways Wm. G. McAdoo, officers and enlisted men of the Army, Navy or Marine Corps, are entitled to purchase tickets at one third the regular cost when traveling in uniform at their own expense. Before obtaining the reduction, it will be necessary to show the ticket agent the official leave of absence or furlough issued by competent authority.
