REGARDING NEW CATTLE DISEASE

Tidewater, Or., Aug. 11, 1918
 Dear Mr. Hayden:-

I have read the article from the County Agent, in your paper, about this new sickness in calves and it says, "he secured a supply of the vaccine and left Saturday for Tidewater to treat the Martinson herd and any other stock likely to be infected." Will say he did not treat mine, I treated mine myself. If I had not, they all would have been dead before he came. I sent him a letter and asked him for some of the vaccine, but it was nearly two weeks before he came around. Now don't understand this to be a kick on our County Agent, it is one of the best offices we have in Lincoln county, but the case is this: in this sickness you got to have the vaccine on hand, and use it as soon as you see the symptoms, or they all will be dead. And everybody can't do it. You got to clip the hair, and disinfect the place where the needle goes in, with one teaspoonful of carbolic acid to a quart of water, and if you stick the needle in the flesh you will have trouble. Last August I was in Corvallis, and come to think about my neighbors calves, so I went up to the O. A. C. and told Prof. B. F. Simms, about the case. He told me it was a new sickness and told me how to use the vaccine. I sent for the syringe or instrument, and this Spring when I saw the first symptoms in one of my calves, I sent for him for the vaccine and in 5 days it came, but the one was already dead, and one more took the intestinal form and only lasted ten hours, and he went before I got the vaccine. When I got it I vaccinated all of them and it saved them all except two, that were sick two days before it came, (vaccine) but even then the vaccine did that much that they lingered two more weeks before they died, so you see we got to have the vaccine on hand or get it dog gone quick, or a good many of them are dead.
