LINCOLN COUNTY AGRICULTURAL COUNCIL NEWS (By the County Agent)

"OREGONS" ARE WINNERS

The Oregon Agricultural College pen of "Oregons," a new breed of chickens, developed at the College by crossing white leghorns and barred plymouth rocks are leading in the International egg laying contest at Storrs, Connecticut. These chickens eat no more feed but lay more eggs than common chickens. The County Agent will be glad to assist any Lincoln County farmer who desires to get a start of these splendid chickens.

FIFTY CENT EGGS

Groceryman Sugg returned Friday from Siletz with a box of eggs for which he paid 50c per dozen. It pays to have chickens that lay eggs—not just cackle about it. Watch out for lice and mites. They are allies of the Kaiser that keep chickens from laying. Get rid of the pests and see how soon the old broody hen will begin making eggs. A box of ashes in the pen is a good thing—the chickens like it

IT PAYS TO RAISE THE BEST POULTRY STOCK

Last year Mrs. M. B. Round, of Toledo, purchased a setting of Plymouth Rock eggs from the O. A. C. six pullets were hatched in August, 1917. At six months of age—right in the heart of winter the six pullets laid 124 eggs in 23 days. An average of 20-23 eggs for each pullet. Mongrel stock would have eaten an equal amount of food and perhaps laid less than half the number. It pays to keep the best.

HAVE YOUR SOIL EXAMINED

County Agent will visit Farms and take samples for later analysis.

For the past five years your new County Agent has been connected with the Soils department of the Oregon Agricultural College. In this capacity he has had experience examining soils from all parts of the state. He would be glad to make soil examinations and recommendations for any farmers in the county, as far as time will permit. If you desire such an examination, write or call the Agent's office for a date. As far as possible it is best that the Agent make a personal examination of the soil on the farm. If this is not done samples brought or sent to the office should be taken according to the specific directions which may be employed by calling or writing to the County Agent's office.
