IMPORTANT NOTICE

Beginning September 15th, the government requests all weekly newspapers to reduce the amount of paper used 15 per cent. In order to meet this requirement, it will be necessary to discontinue every subscription to the Leader not paid in advance. As most of our list is now paid in advance we doubt very much if this will reduce our amount of paper as requested, but we will go over the list as fast as possible in order to conform to the ruling. It will assist us greatly, if our readers who desire to continue on the list will see that their paper is paid in advance.

The voters pamphlet containing all the measures submitted to the voters for their adoption or rejection is now in the hands of the voters of the state and each one is now permitted to judge of the merits of the last measure in the pamphlet submitted by Publisher C. S. Jackson, of the Portland Journal. That he is attempting to legislate for the newspapers outside of his jurisdiction is indicated in the first section of his measure which is applicable only to counties having a population of less than 150,000. Portland, having a population exceeding these figures, of course does not come within the provisions of his measure, and the question naturally arises if his medicine is a panacea for all publishing ills outside of his bailiwick, why is it not equally as effective on himself. The reason is self evident in the fact that Jackson desires to put the country press out of business that he may thrive over their ruins, else why this class legislation that cannot affect him but does affect more than 95 per cent of the papers of the state.—Sheridan Sun.

DON'T FORGET

Failure to register is punishable by imprisonment up to one year. Moreover, there is no alternative of paying a fine.

Though sickness and absence from home will not be accepted as excuses for failing to register, special arrangements have been made for registering sick persons and absentees by mail.

Any one who is unable to present himself for registration on Registration Day must send some competent person to apply to his local board for a copy of the registration card. The friend will be authorized by a representative of the board, if he considers the case bona fide, to take the card back to the sick person and make it out for him. The card must be mailed or taken to the Local Board.

A man who must be absent from his home on precinct on Registration Day should go at once to the local board nearest the place where he happens to be and have his registration card made out and certified to.

This registration card will then be given to the man registering, with the instructions to mail it without delay to his home local board in time to reach the board by Registration Day. This is very important, for the burden is on the registrant of seeing that his home local board receives the card by Registration Day.

He is not registered until his home local board does receive his card.

When mailing the card, the registrant should enclose a self-addressed and stamped envelope for the return to him of a registration certificate.

It is important that every registrant have this registration certificate, and that he keep it always on his person. Otherwise he may be put to very serious inconvenience, including a night in jail, for all police officers are authorized and instructed to arrest men of draft age who cannot produce their registration certificates.
