If dissatisfied with this country, go back to Germany and fight for your own people and the cause of Prussianism and help fasten upon yourselves and your children the cruel system of imperialism. We believe the aircraft material manufactured out of spruce of Lincoln and other coast counties will go very far towards settling the war. While the war has put Lincoln County ahead one hundred years, I don't believe anyone feels to rejoice because of this fact but for the reason that we can and will do everything possible to help win the war. Liberty is nothing, money is nothing and life is not worth living if the Kaiser should win. But this is not possible. Marshal Foches idea is to remember the "Battle of the Marne" and follow the Boches until they make an unconditional surrender. Give them no rest day or night until they give up the unholy cause.

This kind of business is apt to lead to a misunderstanding, and for fear it will, manager Graves of the cannery has asked that we give the matter publicity. He wants to buy everything possible, and will pay top prices. But small, deformed and bruised fruit cannot be bought at any price. It is only fit for hog feed. In order to make a success of our cannery we must do all in our power to boost it along. Go see Mr. Graves before sending in produce. Find out what he wants, and when he wants it, etc. Lincoln County has great possibilities as a fruit section, and we would hate to see the development of these possibilities held up through a misunderstanding.
