INFLUENZA NOT ALARMING IN DIST.

TOTAL OF TWENTY CASES REPORTED TO DATE ; NONE OF VICTIMS SERIOUSLY ILL

Despite the fact that the epidemic of Spanish influenza has become prevalent both in Newport and Toledo, but comparatively few cases have been reported among the uniform men of the District. A total of twenty soldiers have been attacked by the disease but to date there have been no casualties and the few cases which have become serious with complications are recoveries. For the present, there is no prospect of any modification of the restrictions that have been imposed during the epidemic.
