NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN To the legal voters of School District No. 2 of Lincoln County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said District will be held at Grammar School Bldg., on the 20th day of November, 1918 at 1 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

summons be made and served a first prior, and substitute lien and charge against and upon the following described real property with its appurtenances, to-wit:

The southeast quarter of the northwest quarter of Section twenty-six, and the west one half of the northwest quarter, and the northeast quarter of the northwest quarter of section thirty-five, all in Township eleven north of range ten west of the Willamette Meridian, situate in Lincoln County, State of Oregon.
