TROOPS MOVE OUT OF DISTRICT RAPIDLY

January tenth will see the last train leave Yaquina with troops from south of Toledo. After that day only the 83rd Squadron will remain at South Beach and the date of its departure for Vancouver Barracks is not expected to be far distant although not certain at present.
