"KANSAS"

"Kansas, n. pl. tribe of Indians."

Kansas is located in about the center of the "Corn Fed Belt" and to the south of the land inhabited by Nebraskans. On the east the Kansas country extends to the tribal hunting grounds of the "heaven daws" rearing Missourians beyond the dark and stormy KLM, while in the west the empire reaches even unto the foothills of the Rockies.

Kansas is one of the pioneer states of the wily Prohi, and the natives have consequently become more accustomed to the ways of the "blind tiger" and the "speak easy" than those of Christian lands.

Speaking of dryness reminds me of the parson from little old N'Yawk state who made a visit to western Kansas. Upon returning to his home town he was, of course, greeted by the customary query of "what's the matter with Kansas?"

I do not mean to give the impression that Kansas does not produce as notable men as other lands, for such is not the case at all. In the western portion of Kansas the natives still roam about at will, chasing the wild buffalo (not Buffalo, N. Y.) even as in the days of their ancestors. And then one day in the late 90's Wm. J. Bryan crossed the line into Kansas and taught the natives how to cut holes in the walls of their sod houses to serve as windows and doors to let in the light. As a result Kansas went Populist.
