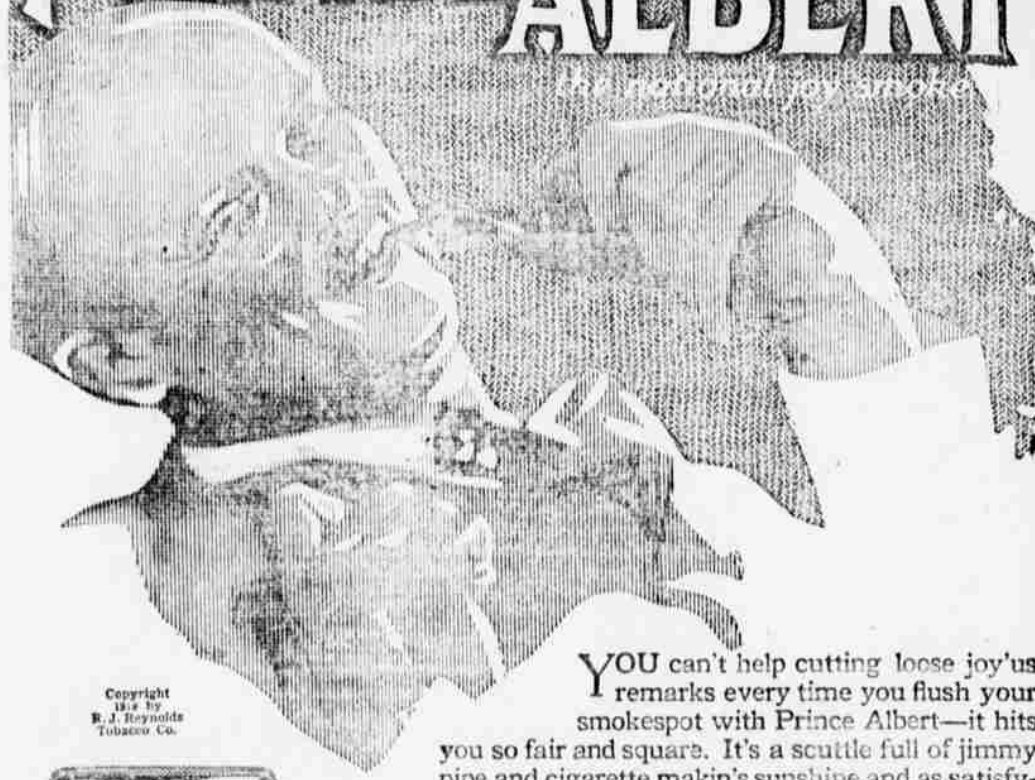

### Dedicated to Mothers of Yank Soldiers



This photograph is dedicated to mothers, sisters and sweethearts of American soldiers who are holding to the fear that German trickery may yet result in resuming of fighting—and a loss of their loved ones. This picture is proof conclusively that the allies' armistice terms have reduced Germany to an utter state of military helplessness. It is the first picture of "American soldiers being mustered out of service." Yanks are here shown handing over their guns to the quartermaster department. Scenes like this will be common now—until the last Yank is back into peace fields.

#### NASHVILLE SCHOOL

A very interesting time and profitable day was spent at the School House Monday February 10, doing some reconstructing. Supt. Cannon was the first man on the job and started the work about 7:30. Soon men with sacks filled with tools and thrown over their shoulders could be seen coming over the hill-tops from all directions. And such a time they all did have hammering, sawing, measuring, prying, fitting and pounding—sometimes all at once.

The work never stopped until noon when a table almost the full length of the school was spread by the good women of the community. And such a feed! Sandwiches, cakes, pies, pickles, salads, chicken, salmon, baked beans, scalloped potatoes and every thing good was served.

Supt. Cannon had to leave on the noon train but left Miss Emerick, the teacher, to take his place and the work continued. By 6:15 all the east windows had been cut out, boarded up and put on the west and north sides, forever doing away with cross lights in the Nashville school. The seats were rearranged, new chalk trays were made and the pictures and maps put back and an entirely different school was the result.

All enjoyed the day immensely and some even wished that it needed to be all done over again the next day.

#### ANTI-VARMINT DAY PLANNED

Men, Dogs and Guns to be Marched for Big All Day Drive on Coyotes, Cats and Other Varmints

A suggestion has been made to the effect that a great deal of good could be done by a big county-wide drive on the coyotes and cats. Within a few weeks there will be hundreds of lambs and kids subject to the ravages of these pests, and if by some concerted action it would be possible to eliminate a number of these varmints before they do their damage, a big saving in the above mentioned young stock, would be effected.

As yet, no definite day has been selected, but the same will be announced through the next issues of the county papers and by special posters and announcements sent to all the communities.

It is hoped that every man who owns a dog and gun will get out on this day. It has been the experience of those running coyotes that a killing could be made if the neighbors on adjacent territory were out on the same day as other hunters. Coyotes started in the Chitwood territory often come in toward Toledo, and vice versa. Oh up your gun and be ready when the call comes.

#### "THE AMERICAN BEADEKER"

#### "OHIO"

Ohio, like ancient Gaul, is divided in three parts. The first part is not fit for the people to live in; the second part the people are not fit to live; and in the third part—well, the least said is the better.

There are three cities in Ohio: Berea, Cincinnati, and Toledo, and also the incorporated village of Cleveland. Natives of Berea have a reputation for great wisdom, they being the discoverers of the method current in Ohio for finding out whether it is day or night. Each morning as they get out of bed they light a match, and in this manner are enabled to determine whether the sun has come up yet.

#### "IOWA!"

In the northern section of Ohio lies the county of Cuyahoga,—so called from the Iroquois "cuyhogan" meaning to eat caviar with a knife. In Cuyahoga county is situated the town of Cleveland, birthplace of the famous German scientist Euclid, inventor of a method of finding out the food value of the contents of a barrel of saurkraut, given the capacity of the barrel and the percentage of capacity filled by the kraut. One of the principal streets of Cleveland is named after this great benefactor.

Cleveland is not frequently visited by Americans, and few who do come have a difficult time in finding their way about. All street signs are in German, and the police of the town are not able to carry on an extended conversation in any other tongue.

In the southern part of Ohio is situated Zinzinnet, the home of beer at "two for 5c each," and not far distant lies the town of Dayton, home of the Wright brothers, inventors of "right shoulder arms."

In the central portion of the state (Columbus and vicinity) is the main tribal hunting ground of the Ohioans. In the winter these natives make the laws for the rest of Ohio and indulge in ice skating. They never trim their toenails, and as a result the nails grow out to the shoe tip and then curve downward and back, growing the full length of the sole to the heel of the shoe and thence curving back upward again. In this manner the natives save the expense of buying skates.

Toledo, Ohio is one of the best cities in the state as well as the largest; about the only point subject to adverse criticism being the name of the place, but the citizens are in no wise to blame for this name being given to Toledo, Oregon, by some disgruntled traveller. Besides, Toledo is by far the nearest of all Ohio towns to Heine Gubaba's place, and only a short distance from the Michigan and Indiana state lines. Some Ohioans have managed to escape during the long winter nights, and there is always the hope that a chance to strike out for Chicago and freedom may come to others also.
