ROOSEVELT HIGHWAY RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The Federal Government has appropriated large sums of money for the building of permanent roads throughout the United States, and especially in the State of Oregon, and through its agents, authorized the expending of the sum of \$2,500,000.00, to be added to a like sum, appropriated by the State of Oregon, for the construction of a road along the entire coast line of said State of Oregon, known as the Roosevelt Highway:

WHEREAS, The State Legislature in joint session adopted aforesaid plan, leaving the same to the electors for final ratification at the special election to be held on June 3rd, 1919:

WHEREAS, Petitions are being circulated, asking the County Court of Lincoln County, Oregon, to call a special election of June 3rd, 1919, for the purpose of bonding said Lincoln County, in the sum of \$175,000.00 in order that said Lincoln County may join with the State Highway Commission in a sum sufficient to build a permanent road from Newport to the Benton County line:

WHEREAS, The County Court of Lincoln County, Oregon, is under negotiations with the State Highway Commission and the Forest Department for the union of forces in building permanent post roads throughout Lincoln County, and especially, in the Alsea and Salmon River Districts:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it Resolved, by the Lincoln County Pomona Grange in regular session at Toledo, Oregon, this twenty-sixth day of March, 1919, that it is the sense of said Grange that it cooperate in every way possible to bring about a successful and early completion of aforesaid projects, thereby making for us better roads, a more thrifty county, and a more contented citizenship.

STEINMETZ SAYS LIME PAYS

(Farm Bureau News)

Many farmers have expressed the opinion that good results would come from the use of lime. Here is some proof. One man in Lincoln County, Mr. E. H. Steinmetz, of Chitwood, has already used a whole carload put it on four years ago and is still getting results. We cannot haul much lime through the mud; consequently, if you have been unable to get some lime for trial this spring, get it during the summer, put it on in the fall and start getting results. Read what Mr. Steinmetz says about his experience:

"Four years ago this spring we got a car of lime. We limed a strip thru a field and sowed oats; it was the last of April when the lime was applied. There was very little rain after and I could not see any results. Then next year the field was sown to oats and vetch. Where the lime was applied the year before the vetch was so heavy I had to have a man follow the mower and turn vetch back before I could make another round, and two feet from where the lime was applied, there was no vetch. Another field that was limed and seeded down was plowed up last fall and sown to rye and vetch, the results can still be seen."
