ALSEA POST ROAD

It seems that a misunderstanding has arisen in the south part of the county with regard to the Court's action toward the building of the Alsea Valley road. To try and clear up this misunderstanding we are publishing the following letters which are self explanatory.

Toledo, Oregon.
March 31, 1919.

Dear Sir:

For several years we have been trying to arrange a plan with your people for co-operation in the improvement of the Alsea road. Our intentions have been sincere, and we thought the requirements of your office had all been properly met. I understand your agent, Mr. Durbin, has given the people of Alsea quite a different version of the case. When I was in your office on the 21st inst., I was shown a plan prepared in your office and forwarded to Washington for approval. We stand ready to pass any resolution or order you require in regard to it. When in your office, I asked for a letter setting out the proposed plan to be addressed to me. This was promised but as yet has not been received.

Pardon me for bothering you with this matter, but if the reports that come to me from Mr. Durbin are true, he is very unjust to say the least. If there is anything we have omitted, please inform me.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of March 31st to Mr. Cecil is just received.
Mr. Cecil is out of the city and I am asking the liberty of replying before his return in order that you may have a reply more promptly.

This office is at a loss to understand what information could have been given out by Mr. Durbin that would create the impression among the residents of the Alsea district that has been reported to you. Certainly no information has been given out from this office that would in any wise be discouraging to the project. Until very recently no definite decision was reached regarding the status of the project, and it is possible that this element of uncertainty may have given to a feeling of lack of interest on the part of the Service.

As you were probably advised by this office on the 21st, permission was given by the Washington office the latter part of February to proceed with the reconnaissance survey of the Alsea River project. This survey has been made and expenditure made directly out of Forest Service funds without asking the County or the State for co-operation. The project was taken up with the State Highway Commission at its meeting on March 27, and the Commission decided to postpone final action until its meeting on April 15. Informally the office has received assurance that the State will probably agree to cooperate. The plan which this office will submit to the Commission at its meeting on the 15th will probably on the basis of a yearly co-operation of \$10,000 each on the part of the County, State and Secretary. This is almost exactly as you have discussed the project on former occasions with Mr. Cecil. You have not been advised prior to this regarding the proposed plan for this project for the reason that there was a bit of doubt as to the exact terms that could be arranged. As a matter of fact, the matter is still unsettled, but should reach a definite decision by the 15th.

Request will be made for a statement from Mr. Durbin, and you will be advised after the office receives the statement.
