

VICTORY NOTES NOT TO LOWER IN PAR VALUE

New Issue Has Special Appeal to All Investors, Says Expert

"Capitalists, as well as the small investor, may purchase the new Victory Loan notes with the fullest assurance that they will hold in the market close to the issue price," declared G. K. Weeks, Victory Loan campaign manager for the Twelfth District, today in calling attention to the strong appeal the Victory notes make to investors strictly from an investment standpoint. He continued:

"It has, of course, been a source of disappointment to subscribers for previous Liberty Loan issues that these issues have gone, even temporarily, to a discount of five or six points in the market.

"While this does not represent a real loss to those who have held their bonds for investment, it is reassuring to subscribers for Victory notes that no such discount is possible in the case of the present issue.

"Discount impossible."

"A decline of the Victory Loan notes of only one point, to 99 for example, would put them on an interest return of 5.02%. Even during the war, with the prospect of continued large issues, no Liberty Bonds have ever declined to any such basis. The Fourth Loan bonds today, as a matter of fact, are selling to yield less than the 4 3/4% paid by the Victory notes at par.

"A similar situation exists in the case of the series of 3 3/4% fully tax-exempt notes which are suitable for the larger investors. The first issue of the fully tax-exempt Liberty Bonds bearing 3 3/4% interest, in spite of all the liquidation during the war, are selling today to yield only 3.55%.

"Should the Victory Loan 3 3/4% notes decline to 99, this would be equivalent to a 4.03% return from its fully tax-exempt note, which would be equivalent to 91 for the Liberty Loan 3 3/4% which now are in active demand in the market at 99."

Some time ago I received a sample copy of your paper thru the Commercial Club of Toledo, Oregon. I like your paper well, its clean and up to the times. You are in a good part of the State, a country chuck full of opportunities. I am herewith sending you the subscription price for six months, as I am interested in your country and desire to learn more of it, as I intend to invest in some of your cheap farm lands. I say cheap, because I see by the farms that are advertised in your paper, that land values are not yet as high as in other parts of the State.

My intention is to come to Oregon, as soon as it can conveniently be done, and buy some of your modest priced land, convert it in a Dairy Farm. Stock, especially milk cows, are my hobby. Judging from what I read of your part of the state of Oregon, climatic conditions would be favorable to carry out such an enterprise.

I have visited Oregon twice. The first time I traveled the western part, the second time I toured the eastern part. I prefer the western part for my line of farming. Conditions have changed a good deal since I have been in Oregon. Land prices have gone up, and it takes more money to make a start now, but by buying land not yet in a high state of cultivation and productivity, I expect to make a start with a somewhat lean pocket-book. For I have observed that the swelling of my purse has not kept pace with land prices in the last ten years.

As this letter is getting lengthy, I will ring off for this time. Hoping that I will soon receive my paper, the Lincoln County Leader, for I am eager to see the list of farms and farm lands advertised therein, also hoping that I may soon be able to step into the Lincoln County Leader office for a hearty hand shake.

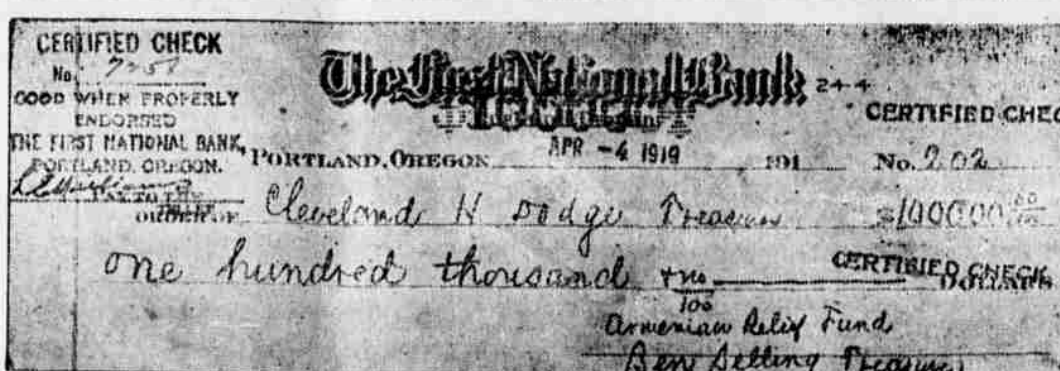
