AL LANE WRITES

Paris, April 15, 1919.

Dear Folks:

I thought I would write you a letter before leaving here for the ship at La Havre. I left there on April 7, so am due back there on the 17th.

After arriving here on April 7, we spent two days on sight-seeing trips around the city. We went through all the principal buildings, that is, Cathedrals, Art Galleries and other public buildings too numerous to mention. Will tell you all about them when I get back. On the evening of the 9th, we left here for Rheims, one of the most completely destroyed large cities in France. We went there mostly to see the ruins of the great cathedral of Rheims. On the 10th we went to Chalons. This city wasn't damaged much, but it was necessary for us to go there to make train connections for Verdun. Arrived at Verdun about noon the next day. From the train we could see trenches, dug-outs, barbed wire entanglements nearly all the way.

Also many cemeteries. Verdun is very badly shot up. We went through the under ground fortification of that city. It is said to be the most strongly fortified city in France. We visited the battlefields around Verdun, principally Dead Man's Hill. We were told that a hundred thousand lives were lost in one day on this hill. It was mostly hand to hand fighting. Underneath this hill was the "Crown Prince's Tunnel". We also went thru that. We saw so many things of interest that it would be hard for me to write it all.

After seeing all we could around Verdun, we went to Chateau-Thierry where the U. S. boys stopped the Germans advance to Paris. We stayed two nights and went to the surrounding battlefields, including Belleau Woods and Hill 204. The woods are nearly all shot down and the ground churned up awful. We saw several large American cemeteries there. I looked over some of them but couldn't find any I knew. I got several shells there and will try to get them home if I can.

When we had finished at Chateau-Thierry we had enough of walking over battlefields, so we came back arriving here at Paris at noon today. It made my feet so sore that I can hardly walk. We have a nice room at a hotel and intend to have a good rest tonight. We are going to take in the boxing tonight at Cirque de Paris.

Will leave here on the morning of the 17th to catch our ship at La Havre. May go out to Versailles tomorrow.

Will write again when I get back to ship.

REGARDING SOLDIERS MAIL

Units or organizations that have been ordered back to the United States frequently leave behind in France a few officers and soldiers to care for property or to adjust the accounts of the organizations, and these are deprived of their mail when notice is given that the organization is returning if notice is not given the postal authorities of the officers and soldiers remaining abroad.

As it frequently happens that correspondents in this country are informed that friends and relatives are remaining in France, it is therefore requested that, in such cases, the envelopes of letters and wrappers of packages be marked "Please forward. Addressee still in France."

This special notation on envelopes and wrappers will be necessary only until the card indexes of the War Department are received showing the officers and soldiers left abroad, but, in order to insure all mail going to France that should be dispatched there the special directions should be used until otherwise requested.
