## HIGHWAY COMMISSION AGRESS TO ROCK ROAD

It is needless to say that the Court accepted the offer at once, as it is estimated that the rock will cost several times as much as the grading, and we are certainly to be congratulated on securing so liberal an offer.

The Highway engineers are now surveying between Wren and Blodgett, in Benton county. As soon as they finish there, they will be shifted to the section between Toledo and Newport. The Court hopes to be able to get this Toledo-Newport section graded and rocked this Fall before the rains set in.
