A MAN MAY BE DOWN BUT HE IS NEVER OUT

To pay the debt the Salvation Army lasses incurred when they went into the front line trenches in France with hot doughnuts and steaming coffee, Oregon has pledged to give to the Salvation Army's Home Service Campaign, June 22 to 30, a fund of \$250,000.

Every cent of this money will be spent in Oregon to construct and maintain maternity and rescue houses, hotels and lodging quarters and to help the poor and needy. This will be the only drive the Army will undertake for a year, which means that the sum total will guarantee the work of the Army for the next two months.

So worthy was the cause and so appreciative of the Army's work in the face of Hun horrors, the Oregon State Elks Association took over the field details of the drive and it is a by word of that national body of live wires that "The Elks never start anything

they do not finish."

Every Elks lodge in the state has formed a complete organization and Elks in cities and towns where there is no lodge will take charge of the campaign in such localities.

Since the close of the war, a slogan brought back by the men in France who used it in reference to the Salvation Army's viewpoint toward life has swept the United States. It is "A man may be down, but he's never out." With this motto as its guide, the Salvation Army will use the money to help the man who is down to recover his place in society.

It is imperative that every city and town in Oregon respond to the appeal and with three counties—Crook, Morrow and Wasco—over the top before the drive has been fairly launched, there seems to be no question but what the state will exceed the quota, half of which is raised in Portland.

RESOLUTION

A resolution setting forth the intention of the city council of the city of Toledo, Oregon, to cause to be constructed a sidewalk on the West side of Hill Street beginning at the North side of the intersection of Fifth Street with Hill Street and extending on the West side of Hill Street to a point Fifty Feet North of the intersection of the North Side of Sixth Street with the West side of Hill Street, and directing the giving of notice thereof.

Be it resolved by the Common Council of the City of Toledo, Oregon, that it is necessary and expedient that a sidewalk be constructed in said city on the west side of Hill Street beginning at the North side of the intersection of Fifth Street with Hill Street and extending on the West side of Hill Street to a point fifty feet North of the intersection of the North side of Sixth Street with the West side of Hill Street and to be constructed as follows: said sidewalk shall be constructed of sound wood plank, two inches thick, laid cross wise, upon stringers running lengthwise, on solid foundation, 4 in number, said stringers to be at least two inches thick and six inches wide, set edgewise, the decking to be eight inches wide and to be laid not further apart than one-half inch, and said walk to be 8 feet in width, and to be laid to conform to the grade and elevation of said street.

The cost of the sidewalk herein provided for shall be paid by the owners of the abutting property and such work shall be done and the materials furnished at the expense of the adjacent property.

The City Recorder is hereby directed to give notice for a period of ten days in the Lincoln County Leader, a newspaper published in the City of Toledo, Oregon, of the intention of the City Council to cause to be constructed said sidewalk which notice shall be to the public in general and to the owners of the adjacent property and shall specify with convenient certainty the street, or part thereof, or sidewalk, or cross walk, proposed to be improved, and shall describe the kind of improvement proposed to be made, giving a description of materials to be used, and the date of the first and the last publications of said notice.
