NOW, THEREFORE, Notice is hereby given by said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners that that portion of the Siletz River lying South and East of the line beginning at a fixed point at the confluence of Scarce Creek with said Siletz River, and running in a straight line to a point directly opposite across said Siletz River situated in the County of Lincoln, State of Oregon, be and the same is hereby closed to fishing of any kind for salmon, sturgeon, trout and other food fishes, except by hook and line, commonly called angling, from and after August 8th, A. D. 1919.

AND IT IS AND SHALL BE UNLAWFUL to take or catch for salmon, sturgeon, trout and other food fishes in any of the above closed waters in any manner whatsoever, except by hook and line, commonly called angling, after said date.

Anyone found violating the provisions of this order will be prosecuted as by statute provided.
