SILETZ

The plant for crushing rock is now complete. The cables are adjusted, the donkey engine placed, plank road to the budge completed for hauling rock. The gasoline engine bought by the county to be used in crushing the rock, came to Toledo several days ago and was being driven to Siletz by a young machinist who forgot to oil the bearings and they were burnt out. This occurred half way to Siletz and this will delay the work several days, a thing to be regretted when the work is so badly needed.

It is the purpose of the road supervisors, Elkins and Lutey, to put the road in good condition for all-weather travel with autos. Engineer Alec McMillan is superintendent of the work on the first contract let by the Court on the new Macadam highway, that is to connect Newport with the Willamette Valley at Corvallis. The present contract calls for the grading and widening of the present county road from the Dundon bridge over Depoe slough to the Parish school house, a distance of about one mile. Other contracts will be let as fast as the survey plans and specification are completed, and bids for the work are advertised for. This is a part of the plan to hard surface the roads of the state, to be located by the Good Roads Commission and their engineer. This is the first time a good roads system has ever been devised for Oregon. Soon our state will be threaded with good roads, same as California. Want it to be nice to drive to Portland and other cities of the state during the winter and keep out of the mud, while the gentle rain is pattering on the roof. What a change from the old days of things, from the six months in the mud, as it used to be. Then you could hear a horse coming to town splashing and dashing thru the mud and water a long time before he got there. When the horse would pull his feet out of the stiff mud it would sound like a popgun. Farmers would go to town, hitch their horses to the rocks and let them stand there in the cold rain while their owners would go into the saloons, play cards and drink whiskey, or go into the stores, sit around the stove, spit tobacco juice on it and talk politics. When time came to work the roads in the spring the supervisor would call out his men and go along the road, fill up the mud holes and washouts with dirt and brush, saying that would do, till the rain came in the fall and wash it out and thus it went on from year to year, till enough money was spent to have built good roads. But now this is all changed and we will not worry about it but go on and build for the future and keep Oregon as she is now, one of the brightest stars in the constellation of states.

A reception and dance were given at the Grange Hall Saturday evening in honor of Alfred Lane and Russell Adams, two young men who had just returned from overseas, having been in the service of the Navy. They were both in the war zone and were convicts in the English channel, conveying troops from England to France. They were often in great danger from submarines and had some very narrow escapes, but neither one of them got wounded, but often their comrades would be killed on either side of them. They helped without flinching to save humanity, liberty and civilization to the world, and we honor them as true heroes. This party was given in their honor; though small, it showed the spirit of the community. A nice lunch was served and all had a good time.

Knot C. Egbert, former superintendent at Siletz, is now on a visit to his old stomping ground, surrounded as it is with many pleasant memories. He had been at his fruit farm at Goodno, state of Washington. He has a splendid crop of almonds and apricots. Mr. Egbert likes Siletz and may, at some future time, make his home here. He was in the service here for ten years and is well acquainted with the Indian character and says the Indian, like many white people, neglects his business and spends his money too freely.

STATE GAME WARDEN'S NEWS BULLETIN

"There is to be no shooting of elk in Oregon during the year 1919." Such was the declaration made by State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker, who has received a number of inquiries as to the date of the opening of the season for hunting elk. In order that the misunderstanding may be corrected, the Game Warden explained that the 1909 law protected elk until August 1, 1919, but this law was repealed by the 1913 Legislature and perpetual protection was provided for this noble animal. "There will be no open season on elk in this state at any time unless the Legislature fixes one at some future session. We only have a few elk in the state and an open season would kill practically all of these off," said Mr. Shoemaker.

COUNTY COURT BUYS MORE ROAD MACHINERY

The County Court received another tractor last Saturday for use in operating the rock crusher at Siletz. Tuesday they received a new three and a half ton Federal truck, purchasing same thru Curry & Snuffer, local agents. This is all good machinery and will aid materially in pulling Lincoln County out of the mud.

ASK FOR BRIDGE AND ROAD UP RIVER

A large delegation of southsiders and Elk City people met with the County Court Wednesday afternoon and requested that the Court build a bridge across the Yaquina River here, and have the Newport-Corvallis highway located across this bridge and then up the river via Elk City. S. W. Scoville, J. C. Dixon of Elk City, E. P. Curry, J. W. Parrish and others expressed their views on the matter, all favoring the river route.

The Court informed those present that they had left the matter of locating the road entirely with the Highway Commission, and that they would make no recommendation in the matter. If the highway engineers see fit to locate the road up the river, well and good, and if it is located on the present route to the Valley the Court will abide by their decision.

Some of the persons present did not seem to like this decision, but we believe with the Court, that this is the only fair way to decide the matter.

SILETZ ROAD WORK WILL BE RUSHED

The work of rocking the Toledo-Siletz road will be commenced in earnest next Monday when two trucks with a capacity of three yards of gravel to the load will be put to work, and will be operated two shifts daily until the job is completed.

The rock crusher has been moved down the river to a new gravel bar where an abundance of gravel can be secured. The new tractor will supply ample power for crushing the rock and the two trucks will put it on the road in lively fashion. The steam roller will then roll it down in place and a good winter road will be assured.

NEW SAWMILL BEGINNING TO RISE

Work on the new mill of the Fischer-Storrey Lumber Company is coming right along. The piling for the mill are nearly all driven, they being driven down about thirty feet to solid foundation. The floor joist are being placed, and the framing of the mill proper will soon be commenced. As soon as the pile driver crew finish at the mill, they will move over and start driving piling for the power plant. They will drive a network of piling to solid foundation, this will then be filled in with concrete, giving the plant a permanent solid foundation. The plant will generate 1000 h. p.

GRAND JURY REPORT

We, the Grand Jury duly empanelled at the February, 1919 term of the Circuit Court for Lincoln County, Oregon, desire to report as follows:

That a new cement sidewalk be built from the front door of the Court House around the north side thereof and connecting with the cement sidewalk on the east side of the Court House.

That the vault in the offices of sheriff and clerk be enlarged sufficiently to properly care for the records of the County.

We have completed our work and asked to be discharged.
