WOOL MARKET SITUATION

The wool growers of the county will undoubtedly be interested to have a little information upon the wool market. While it is rather a difficult proposition to forecast the price that will be paid for wool before the end of the season, it appears clear that the present time is not a very satisfactory one to sell wool, particularly of the coarser grades, unless a price of about 50 cents per pound can be obtained. The county agent is in receipt of letters from all the large wool-buying houses and commission merchants of the Northwest particularly, and from a number of institutions in the East, and with but one exception, all of these companies indicate it as their opinion that there will be a stronger market for the coarse grades of wool this fall. The following extract from one of the largest commission firms in the East, Adams & Leland, of Boston, sums up the situation:

"The demand for the medium and coarse grades of wools at this time is quite limited owing to the mill's present orders running very largely to goods being made of fine wool. It is generally believed that a change to coarser fabrics will be seen this fall and it would be our judgment that as the foreign markets on coarse and medium wools are quite strong, better results would be obtained for the members of your association if they waited awhile before selling their wool. This same also applies, we believe, equally well to mohair."

PREPARE YOUR EXHIBITS EARLY FOR THE COUNTY FAIR

As announced previously, the county fair this year will be held on the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth of September. Exhibits are expected from very community in the county. The fair board is particularly anxious to have farmers all over the county prepare their exhibits as early as possible and advise the fair board of the approximate amount of space that they will desire. Arrangements are being made for special grange exhibits from all the granges, and keen competition is expected between the various communities that are arranging to put on special community exhibits.

As it is planned to take the county fair exhibit to the state fair this year, and then, to select from the state fair exhibit the best permanent display materials to be placed on exhibition in the Oregon building at Portland, at which place these exhibits are viewed by a large percentage of home-seekers coming into Oregon, it is highly important that the best exhibit be secured for the county fair this year. A good county exhibit is possible only in case the various sections of the county come through in good shape with their individual exhibits. Comparatively good roads, at least at this time of the year, the automobile and truck, will make possible the assemblance of the exhibits as has not been possible in the county before.
