THAT SUMMER DESSERT.

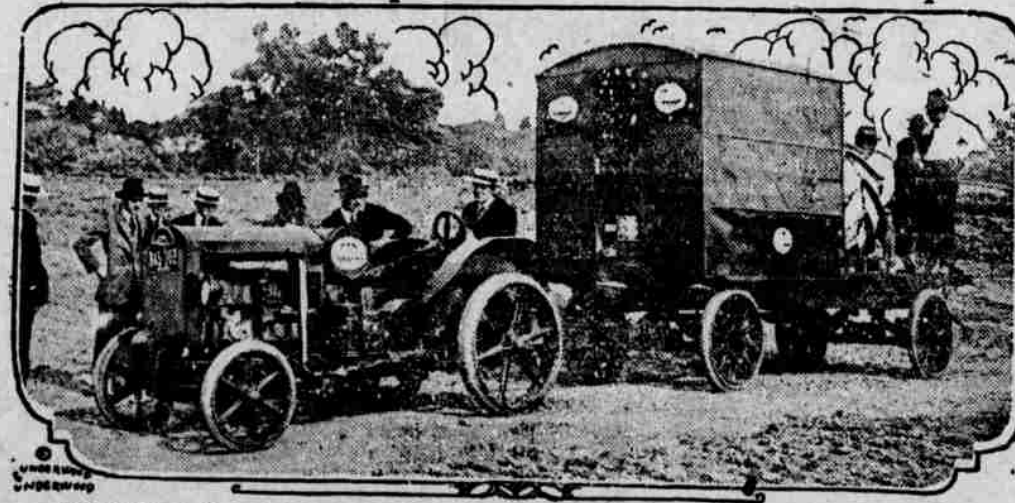
