W.S.S. RAILROAD OFFICIALS PAY TOLEDO VISIT

Exhibits at the county fair this year will represent the possibilities of many lines of agricultural practices that might be well extended in the county, and the fair board this year will place emphasis upon the dairy and goat industries.

At the present time our dairy industry, while not as big as it has been in the county previously, is growing rapidly, and from virgin possibilities has the opportunity of being one of the major industries of the county. The thousands of acres of high, rough, brushy hill land provide the very best kind of range for the goat. Once the brush and fern are destroyed on these and other areas, the possibility of growing grass and later running sheep or cattle on these ranges is made possible. On the other hand, the dairy cow is more naturally suited to the low or meadow lands and will be most productive here. Undoubtedly this combination of goats on the hilltop and cows on the meadow is a meritorious one.

To John H. Carpenter and Margaret M. Carpenter, the above named defendants:

In the Name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled Court and suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: on or before the 30th day of August, 1919, and if you fail so to answer for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to said court and take a judgment and decree against you for the relief demanded in said complaint, viz:

For a judgment against you in the sum of \$300.00, together with interest thereon at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from May 8th, 1917, until paid, for \$75.00 attorney's fee, and for her costs and disbursements of said suit; for a foreclosure of the mortgage in said complaint described given to secure the payment of said sum of \$300.00, and interest as aforesaid, and that the whole of the land and premises described in said mortgage be adjudged to be sold by the sheriff of Lincoln County, Oregon, according to the law and practice of said Court, and the proceeds of such sale applicable therefore be applied in payment of the amount due plaintiff, principal and interest on said note and mortgage plaintiff's costs and disbursements herein, and attorney's fees as aforesaid, cost of sale and accruing costs. That defendants be forever barred and foreclosed of all right, title, claim or equity of redemption in said premises hereinafter described, and every part and parcel thereof, except as provided by law.

That the sheriff of said county, execute and deliver to the purchaser of said premises at such sale, a deed when the time for redemption has expired, that plaintiff or any other party to this suit may become a purchaser at such sale, and that the purchaser thereof be let into the possession of the whole and every part of said land and premises on the production of the sheriff's certificate of sale of said premises, and if such possession be refused, then the said sheriff shall put said purchaser in the exclusive possession of every part of said premises, and that plaintiff have such other and different relief as to equity seemeth just.

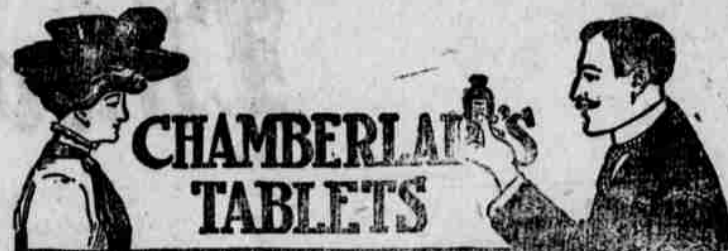

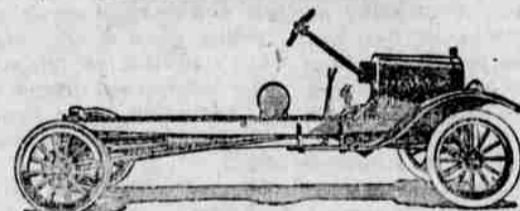
