SILETZ

Tuesday evening a car load of Siletz people, including two young men that had served in the Navy overseas, Russell Adams and Alfred Lane, went to Newport to hear the address of First Lieut. Lamar Toose, who was to speak in the First Presbyterian Church at 8:30 P. M. The church was not as well filled as it should have been for such an occasion. The speaker was introduced by Hon. B. F. Jones, who paid a brilliant tribute to the American soldier who left father, mother, sister, brother and sweetheart and crossed the seas to go and fight and give his life if need be for the liberty of his country and the preservation of the rights of man. When the Lt. stepped forward on the platform he was greeted with a round of applause. The Lieut. was in some of the great battles of the Argonne Forest, in the thickest of the fight. Here his brother, who was also a Lieutenant, was killed by a German sniper. Just before he received his fatal shot his brother warned him to be more careful in exposing himself but he only smiled and went on towards the enemy. Such was the death of 60,000 brave boys who now sleep beneath the clouds of sunny France, a sacrifice for the liberty of the world. We who never saw it know but little about the horrors of a battle field. Lt. Toose said the war closed a week too soon. He said the American army was so well organized and so full of the fighting spirit that within another week they would have captured the German imperial army and would have gone right on to Berlin. This would have completed the world war in the right way and saved a vast amount of trouble they are now having with the League of Nations and other things in adjusting matters to a peace basis. The Lieut. thought if Shantung should go to Japan with its 60,000,000 people that proud nation might form an alliance with China, with her four hundred million people, with Russia, Germany and the other belligerent nations and once again endanger the peace of the world. He believed it was best for America to keep clear of foreign complications and maintain our freedom and individuality as a nation as founded by Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, Patrick Henry, Franklin, Hamilton, Jay and the Lees, and preserved by Abraham Lincoln. This is the best government on earth and we don't want to have our country smothered by seeking alliances with dangerous and discordant elements. "Too many cooks spoil the broth."

During the week Mr. and Mrs. Chaffin had the pleasure of a visit from some of their friends and relatives from the state of Washington. This party consisted of Mrs. J. H. Bristol, Mr. and Mrs. Dr. H. H. F. Power and two daughters of Portland and Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Flower and their daughter, Miss Alma Flower, of Brickleton, Washington. This party was spending a few weeks at Newport, Oregon's popular resort. They were taken in autos to various places of interest on the reservation. Among these to the big timber along the Siletz river and to Eucire Mt. and up to the gorge where the river emerges from the great mountains and hears no sound save its dashings. They were very much impressed with the beauty of Siletz valley, the richness of its soil, and the healthfulness of its climate.

Jesse F. Gwynn has just returned home from a two years service in Uncle Sam's army, fourteen months of that time being spent over seas in the front lines of the Argonne Forest. He was stationed at Goblentz, on the Rhine. He was a doughboy and belonged to the 4th Div. 58 Inf. and was engaged in five battles at the front in the Argonne Forest, but fortunately he was never wounded. He too, speaks of the horrors of war and hopes something may be done to prevent it ever occurring again.

Half the people of Siletz went over to Toledo Sunday evening to see the Bathing Beauties in conjunction with Yankee Doodle in Berlin. The characters were fine and well represented. The house was crowded and everyone enjoyed the fine pictures presented and the great men that appeared in life size, Kaiser Bill, the Crown Prince, Von Hindenburg, Ludendorff, the Emperor, and the great naval man, Von Terpi, were on exhibition and they were a sporty set of fellows, just such as would like to have the world under their control so they could do as they pleased with the rest of mankind. From their round heads and coarse features they looked like they were four fifths animal. This does not apply to the disposed Empress, she is a

good looking woman. Sergeant Dick Adams sang several selections and was encored and loudly applauded. He made a hit with the big audience.

BRIDGE ASSURED ACROSS YAQUINA RIVER

In conversation with Engineer Bishop of the State Highway Department, Wednesday, he informed us that the route of the Newport-Corvallis highway had finally been definitely located, the route being from Newport to Toledo, thence across the Yaquina river, thence up the south side to Elk City, thence via Pioneer, Chitwood, Eddyville, and the Little Elk Valley to Blodgett. Mr. Bishop informed us that the mileage this way will be just the same as it would be on the route over Pioneer Mt. via Simpson Creek, the advantage of the new route being that it will be practically a water grade.

While the people on the Pioneer Mt. road will be disappointed that the road is not coming their way, still they cannot but see the logic of the engineers in securing the best grade possible. The building of the bridge will be acclaimed with joy by the south side people and the road up the river will do much toward putting Elk City on the map. The building of the bridge will mean much to the whole of Lincoln County.

ALL DOGS MUST WEAR TAGS

Beginning January 1st, 1920, all dogs in the State of Oregon must be licensed, and wear their license tag. The license fee has been fixed at \$1.00 for males and \$2.00 for females. The license tags are secured from the County Clerk in each county. Three months after the law goes into effect, all dogs not so licensed will be killed, and the owner thereof will also be subject to a fine of \$10.00.

This law was passed by the last legislature.

DRIFT CREEK TIES AND TIMBER TO BE CUT

The vast stretches of timber in the Drift Creek region, Alsea, is going to be opened up very shortly now says John Brown, of Greeham, who was in the city a day or two ago enroute to that section to look over the situation and get things started. He was over there once before this season or last year and was the only man who had actually been thru that tangled and isolated timber section. Mr. Brown says there is a million feet of first-class timber, and young-growth fir in such extent that it will make the Drift Creek region the best timber country on the coast. It is expected that this will be logged off down the river, but if not, big mills will be put in to cut the timber up into lumber.—Corvallis-Gazette Times.

RADDANT BUYS COMBINE

Emil T. Raddant of Orton was in the city last Saturday after a "Combine," (harvester and thrashing machine combined) which arrived on Friday evening's freight. The machine was loaded on wagons and trucks and taken to Orton to be set up. It can be operated entirely by one man, takes six horses to pull it, cuts an eight foot swath, and will cut and thrash from twelve to fifteen acres per day.

We believe that this is the first combined harvester in the county.

Mr. Raddant has a hundred acres of grain to harvest this season.

INVESTIGATORS WILL VISIT THIS COUNTY

The Congressional committee appointed to investigate the operations of the Spruce Production Division, is expected to arrive down from Portland tomorrow. The personnel of this committee consists of Congressman Frear, chairman, of Wis., Congressman Magee of New York, and Congressman Lea of California. They will be accompanied by Colonel Stearns and Major Harrington of Portland.

These gentlemen will view the mill and railroads built by the S. P. D. in this county, and will also be shown the jetty work being done at the entrance to the harbor. Upon their arrival here tomorrow evening they will be met by Lieut. Patterson, who is in charge of the S. P. D. property in this county, and will be shown thru the big mill. The next day they will be taken to Newport by boat, and taken over the north line and will view the mill near Otter Rock. They will then be run over the south line to the Yachats spruce, returning in time to leave on the noon train for Portland Monday.

It has been a great puzzle to the people of this community to understand why the S. P. D. passed up Depoe and over the low divide into the heart of the Siletz spruce belt, and built their railroad, instead from Yaquina around up the coast. We are in hopes that this investigation will clear up this puzzle, and also why the soldiers in the Spruce were entitled to more pay than were the soldiers in the trenches.
