HARRY WHITE SAYS, "PLANT LOGANBERRIES"

(Farm Bureau News)

When we read what some of the
loganberry growers have made this
year, it listens better than a gold
mine proposition at 10 cents per share.
Here is one from Bruce Cunningham
who has a forty acre patch of logan-
berries about four miles south of Sa-
lem. His yield this year was two
hundred tons or an average of five
tons per acre.

His total cost of production, includ-
ing training, hoeing, cultivating and
fertilizing was \$57.00 per acre, or \$2-
280.00. Picking cost two cents per
lb., or \$40.00 per ton, making his
total cost of picking \$8,000.00. De-
ducting these amounts from his gross
income of \$32,000.00, leaves a net profit
of \$21,720.00.

We think that Lincoln County has
the Willamette Valley skinned forty
ways for Sunday as a berry county. In
the first place we have a more
suitable climate for raising berries be-
cause we do not have the hot winds
and as hot weather as they have in
the Valley. Combining this with a
rich fertile soil make a combination
that is ideal for berry culture.

In order to make the berry industry
a success in Lincoln County, there
should be a large enough acreage
planted to make it a paying propo-
sition for a cannery or juice plant to
operate.

The Toledo Canning Co. assure us
that they will take all of the logan-
berries that we can raise at top prices,
so it is up to us to get busy and
plant loganberries.

The management of the cannery
will be glad to talk to anyone who
is planning on setting out berries and
can furnish information in regard to
getting plants and cost of picking, etc.

Let's get behind this berry propo-
sition and put Lincoln County on the
map as a berry producing county as
well as building up an industry that
will mean hundreds of thousands of
dollars to the people of Lincoln county.
