#### PRICE OF NEWSPAPERS

The Seattle Times has increased the price of its daily paper to \$2 a month, \$24 a year, with Sunday edition price 25c per copy. An exchange in commenting on this remarks that such a price is prohibitive—but is it?

If a thousand other prices on various things paid every day by the people are right, or anywhere right, then \$2 a month for a good daily paper is not too much.

They pay more than that for electric light, instead of burning a lamp. They pay more than that for gas. They pay more than that for riding on the street cars instead of walking. They pay more than that for going to the movies. They pay ten times that for keeping up an automobile. Why, then, should they not be willing to pay \$2 a month for practically all the education and information they get?

There is no commodity on the face of the earth today so cheap as a newspaper. As a general rule the reader does not pay the cost of the white paper used in its construction, much less for the work of compiling, editing, news-gathering, printing and hundreds of other things which enter into the expense account. They get all the news of the whole world, printed and delivered at their doors, morning and evening, for 2 cents, and it is all wrong, and would be a huge joke if it were not so serious to the publisher, the same applies to the weekly paper, in proportionate degree. People have been given a whole encyclopedia for a few pennies and now they expect just that, and then often roar because it is not enough.

They pay a nickel for one egg, but don't pay but half that for a newspaper. Possibly what the editor should do is to go lay an egg. Note this comparison: Shoes, \$10 to \$12 a pair; best bacon, 70c a pound; sliced-toiled ham, 90c; whiskey \$10 a pint—NEWSPAPERS TWO CENTS! Can you beat it?

## HERO NAMED ESCORT TO SOLDIER DEAD



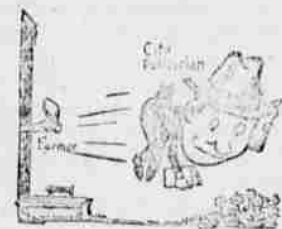

## SUMMONS FOR PUBLICATION IN FORECLOSURE OF TAX LIEN

To Miles L. Rogers and John H. Larson, the above named defendants: In the Name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby notified that W. C.
