SILETZ

You are the looser if you miss the Extension School at Siletz, Friday and Saturday, Feb. 27 and 28.

The dairyman and stock raisers of the community met Saturday afternoon at the Cheese Factory for the purpose of discussing the proposition of re-organizing and starting the factory up again. A fair representation of farmers attended the meeting. The discussion was pretty thorough, really all present taking part in it. It is a progressive move and if carried out will place the farmers of Siletz upon a solid basis of progress and prosperity. Tillamook has made good in the cheese business and this industry alone has brought millions of dollars to the farmers of that county; in fact, it has made the farmer independent, and every one prosperous. What Tillamook has done, Lincoln can do if the farmers will but organize and stay with the business. We ought to have spirit and local pride enough to do as well if not better than other counties. Tillamook and Coose, who have no better facilities for making cheese or butter than we have, are making money right along. The building for the factory is already complete, and it will be inexpensive to start up again. At the meeting \$400 was pledged to aid in starting up the coming spring. The farmers are getting more and a better grade of cows and are cultivating and improving their farms more than ever before. The Indians are getting patients to their land and it is up to them whether they will improve their farms and make homes or let it go to the white man. Another meeting will be called soon to take further action in the matter. Many of the old stock holders have dropped out and the new organization will be composed largely of new men.

Rev. Walter Ross, pastor of the M. E. Church at this place, has gone to attend a meeting called at Salem on the 17th, by Edwin Blaird Mills, Board of Home Missions, a church extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church on frontier work. A thorough discussion of all phases of the work among the Indians will be taken up.

Died, at Siletz, February 18th, Mrs. Josely Brown, aged 35 years. Mrs. Brown was born and raised near the Agency, just across the river. She had eleven brothers and sisters and leaves five children, three girls and two boys to mourn her loss. Her father's name was Short Ben, or as some called him, Chetco Ben. Mrs. Brown was educated at the Chemawa Indian school. The funeral was largely attended, and was conducted by Rev. Walter Ross.

The weather is fine and a good many farmers are plowing their ground for early seeding. Some weather prophets say we will have lots of rain yet before spring comes.

We are having a run of colds but nothing so far that rises to the dignity of Spanish Influenza.

COUNTY ATHLETIC MEET

Last Saturday afternoon the principals of Siletz, Newport and Toledo Schools met to form a temporary athletic association for this county. It was decided to arrange for a county meet at the time the County Institute meets in annual session. It was thought that these events might well be arranged to be held at the same time and place.

It is planned to hold both a High School and a Grammar Grade Meet. They are to be under the same management and at the same place and time, however they are to be separate and distinct. The usual track and field events will be listed for each division. This list is not complete, neither do we know that we shall have all those already listed. All rural and other schools are invited to enter these contests, and it is hoped that none will go unrepresented. In the meantime, all teachers should get in communication with Mr. Miller of Siletz and arrange for whatever events they wish. Further information may be had from him or either of the above named principals. Following is a tentative list of probable events:

High School: High and broad jump; 50 and 100 yd. dash; 220, 440, 880, and 1760 yd. race; 220 low and 120 high hurdles; pole vault; discus, hammer, javelin, shot, and some more.

Grammar Grades: High and broad jump; 50 and 100 yd. dashes; 440 yd. relay; light shot, probably pole vault; low hurdles, and others called for.

Girls: Jumps; 30 and 50 yd. dashes; 120 yd. relay, etc.

All rural teachers should take advantage of this opportunity to let at least some of her pupils compete with their fellows in some or all the events. The constitution and by-laws of the State Association have been adopted for the year. At the meet we expect to form a permanent organization. We may or may not finally adopt these rules. CHITWOOD HAS CASE OF SMALLPOX

County Health Officer Dr. R. D. Burgess was called to Chitwood Sunday to investigate the illness of Mr. D. E. Dewey, who had been sick for a week or so, and who was thought to have smallpox. The Dr. went at the request of some of the citizens of Chitwood, and found that Mr. Dewey was suffering from quite a severe case of smallpox. He at once quarantined the house and took the necessary steps to prevent the spread of the dread disease.

Mr. Dewey was recently at Portland, and it is presumed that he was exposed to the disease while there, as there are a number of cases in the city. He came home and took down with it. They doctored with home remedies and did not call a doctor. Quite a number of persons were exposed before the doctor was called and the quarantine established, so it is very likely that there will be more cases develop. All those exposed have been vaccinated, and everything possible done to head off the disease.
