SILETZ

The Extension School held at Siletz Friday and Saturday was well attended by the farmers, their wives and the High School pupils. The men's meeting was held in the Grange Hall and the ladies' meeting was held in the Government building. Prof. E. B. Fitts and Prof. W. S. Carpenter, of the O. A. C. Extension Service, lectured at the men's meeting and Miss Jessie Biles and Miss Lassie Lane had charge of the ladies' meeting. These teachers were also from the O. A. C. Extension Service and their work included domestic science and cutting, sewing and fitting of garments. A large class attended this meeting and all speak of the valuable information they received. Miss Lane, of the domestic science department, showed how a chicken could be cooked by compressed steam. The rooster she cooked was quite old, some say he came off of Noah's Ark, anyway, it took only 40 minutes to cook him and he was as tender as a spring chicken. A tough piece of beef was cooked in 40 minutes and it was as tender as lamb. It was instructive. Prof. Carpenter lectured in the forenoon, Friday, on the breeding and raising of stock and the seeding of burnt off land for pasture. A subject that greatly interested the stock raisers and dairymen. Prof. Fitts is a man of wide experience as a dairymen and stock breeder and his lecture was most interesting and instructive. He had maps and charts and demonstrated how to get the best balanced food for dairy cows, to get the best results. After listening to these lectures, it seems but little more could be said in the way of taking care of dairy cows. On Saturday a herd of dairy cows were brought in, Holstein and Jersey, so the professor could demonstrate how to select a good dairy cow. The points were made so plain that any one hearing the points could select a good dairy cow. These cows were owned by Mr. Deas, Maurice Anderson, and Giles Clin. Prof. Fitts said they were a good grade of dairy cows and by breeding up could be made first class. Ascent Cooter had charge of the school and his success was largely due to his efforts. Several committees were appointed. Mrs. W. S. Hall was appointed chairman on home economics, assisted by Mrs. E. L. Chaffin and Mrs. M. S. Collins. Mrs. Bert Robinson was appointed chairman of the committee on chicken raising and culling, assisted by Mrs. Charles Larsen and Mrs. M. Andersen. Mrs. Andersen was appointed on committee of decoration. She has not chosen her assistants.

The cheese factory that has been lying dormant for several years, was taken up and a new organization was effected by electing the following officers: Chris Larson, president; Ralph Hamar, secretary and treasurer; Board of Directors: Ralph Hamar, A. C. Crawford, L. C. Blowers and Joe Kosydar. The books were open and several persons took stock in the company. At the close of the organization Prof. Fitts was called on for a speech. The professor was optimistic and made an eloquent address. He said the farmers must stand together and co-operate in the building up of industries in their own communities and keep the money at home. Establish your own brand and market your own product at one place. Put in a factory that will make a number one product and build up a name for fair dealing second to none in the state. Let the Siletz cheese be as good as Tillamook or any other county. The speaker said the climatic conditions at Siletz were just right for making butter and cheese, said Siletz was the most beautiful valley in Oregon. The people at Siletz feel very grateful for the interest that Mr. Cooter and his teachers take in the welfare of this community. We also feel proud of the O. A. C., an institution that is doing so much good for the state of Oregon and especially for Lincoln County. It is a good recommendation to be a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College. A splendid dinner was prepared for both days. 125 plates were prepared and all were taken. The fine weather helped to bring the big crowd out.
