SILETZ

A Farm Bureau was organized at Siletz by electing the following officers: Chairman, Chris Larson; secretary, Ralph Hamar. This is a farm organization and one of the best to protect and develop the interest of the farmer. Important questions will be discussed at every meeting. The first projects taken up will be as follows: Cheese making, Chris Larson, leader; Stock breeding, A. Deets, leader; Clover production, Ralph Hamar. It has been said the Siletz is not a good place for the growing of clover. This is a great mistake. The clovers do as well here and grow as rank as any place in Oregon. The Alsike is especially adapted to this country the damp climate, low land and rich soil is just what the Alsike and other species of the clover family need to make it grow to perfection in Siletz.

The farmers here are putting in practice what they have learned from the teachers of the O. A. C. When people are busy they have no time to talk about their neighbors. "Idleness is the devil's workshop."

The river has raised sufficient to float the saw logs down to the mill and now the mill is sawing right along.

Several new farm houses will be built this summer. Among those that are planning to build we may mention Clayton Pond, A. Deets, Giles Olin and some new folks from Corvallis will build, who bought the ten acre piece of land from Jim Franks.

Ord Castle has just finished moving his house over on his five acre piece of land near the public school building. Since Mr. Castle has got moved and fixed up pretty nice, he has been offered \$2500 for the place. It is a nice home. He don't want to sell it.

SILETZ HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

We are having some sunshine and rain at school and out of school.

The pupils all started the second semester with good records, having all passed the examinations.

Mary Henry entered high school Monday. She attended this school two years ago.

The high school pupils and Miss Farnham took an afternoon about two weeks ago, and went for a General Science trip. They collected different species of wood, ferns, of rocks, lichens (they found lichens) mosses, and other things which nature displays at this time of the year. The samples obtained have been analyzed and studied. The specimens of wood have been cut and polished and prepared for mounting.

The General Science class is making a collection of various kinds of wood, rocks, etc., for their cabinet.

Every Wednesday afternoon the high school pupils and some of the grade pupils assemble to practice singing, or in other words for a chorus practice.

Later the officers have been saying that they will resign but we all hope they will not do so, as it is good practice and they may need this practice some day.

CHEESE MEETING TO BE HELD AT TAFT

Cooperative Cheese factories are needed in the north end of the county. One on Salmon River, one on Morris Lake, one at the south end of Lake, one on Schooner Creek, one on Drift River, and one on Siletz River near the bay. These all combined hiring good cheese makers, and a better price can be obtained for our cheese and pay better than shipping cream. Three of these factories have gone in together already and are looking for a cheese maker, namely, the Ruch factory, now owned by Hill & Hall, the Bones factory and the Parmelee factory. The last named will be moved further up Drift River this spring. Now is the time to get this factory located where it can be used to the best advantage for the milk in that section, and be owned by the company. Edgar Parmelee has already ordered a 5 horse power boiler to be shipped in on the next boat from Portland. He is preparing to build on his place near the new barn. This in all probability is not the best location to accommodate the dairies in Drift River valley.

Therefore a meeting is being called at Taft Monday, March 15th, to organize a cooperative company and take this factory over. All persons running a dairy or owning land tributary to Drift River should be there, or send a representative. Those owning land or otherwise, who take share will draw a dividend, and have a vote in the location of the factory. Don't fail to be there.
