NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF LIBERTY LOAN COUPON BONDS

In order to place bonds in the hands of the public during the Liberty Loan Campaign, the United States Government engraved and printed temporary bonds with four or more coupons attached, in which, by their terms, are exchangeable after the date of the last interest coupon thereon for permanent bonds to maturity.

The following table shows when such temporary bonds should be presented to be exchanged for permanent bonds:

First Loan May 1st, 1920
Second Loan May 1st, 1920
Third Loan May 1st, 1920

The State University Agricultural College and the State Normal

have for many years spent less money per student per year in training Oregon boys and girls than is spent at any other state institution.

The present cost at the State University is \$203 a year; at the College, it is \$180. But even before the war, when money would buy twice as much as it buys now, the average cost at all other state institutions was \$325 a year.

In addition Their Building Investment is also very low

At the State University it is at present \$222 per student; at the College, \$300. But in state institutions elsewhere, statistics show the average to be \$395.

These are convincing proofs of economical administration, but the three institutions can no longer give satisfactory training to the vast numbers of Oregon boys and girls (5400 in fulltime courses alone), unless they receive more support.

On May 21 the Higher Educational relief measure will appear on the ballot. You are urged to preserve the quality of higher education by voting for it.

Sale of Siletz Indian Lands

The following list of Indian lands located on the Siletz Indian Reservation, Lincoln County, Oregon, is offered for sale under existing laws. SEALED BIDS for the same will be received until 2 o'clock P. M., on May 5, 1920, when the bids will be opened for consideration. All bids shall be enclosed in a sealed envelope, which must be conspicuously marked "BID FOR INDIAN LANDS." The DATE of the proposed sale must also be placed thereon, but nothing else. No bidder will be permitted to include more than one allotment in any one bid. Should a prospective purchaser desire to purchase more than one allotment he should submit a separate bid for each, and if he desires to purchase less than an entire allotment, he may submit a bid for one or more legal subdivisions thereof and such bid will be considered in connection with the appraised value of each such legal subdivision. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. The right to reject any or all bids is reserved by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Each bid must be accompanied by a duly certified check, certificate of deposit or cashier's check on some solvent bank, payable to the order of Edwin L. Chalcraft, Superintendent, for ten per cent (10%) of each bid, as a guarantee for the faithful performance by the bidder of his proposals. Cash in lieu of check will not be accepted and will cause bid to be rejected, if the bid shall be accepted, and the bidder shall comply with the terms of due notice of the acceptance of his bid fail to comply with the terms of his bid by making final payment, the money represented by such check shall be forfeited to the use of the owner of the land. The checks of all unsuccessful bidders will be returned to them within ten days after the opening of bids.

The successful bidders will be called upon to pay the costs incurred in advertising this land for sale, and the receipt of a bid will be considered evidence that the bidder accepts this requirement. The cost for advertising will be kept to the minimum consistent to giving this advertisement due publicity.

The patent issued to purchasers will contain a provision to the effect that there is reserved from the lands granted a right of way for ditches and canals constructed under authority of the United States.

Deferred payments at six per cent interest can generally be arranged, provided a payment of not less than twenty-five per cent of the purchase price is made when the bid is accepted. The bidder should mention the allotment number, name of allottee, give the description of the land covered by his bid, and the character of payments intended.
