How much should I give to make this a better world?

A CERTAIN man in New York filed out his
income tax report.

It showed an income so large that his tax was
53%. And his total gifts to church and char-
ity for the year were \$148.

Think of it—thousands spent for luxuries and
pleasure for himself; and \$148 to leave the world
a little better than he found it!
