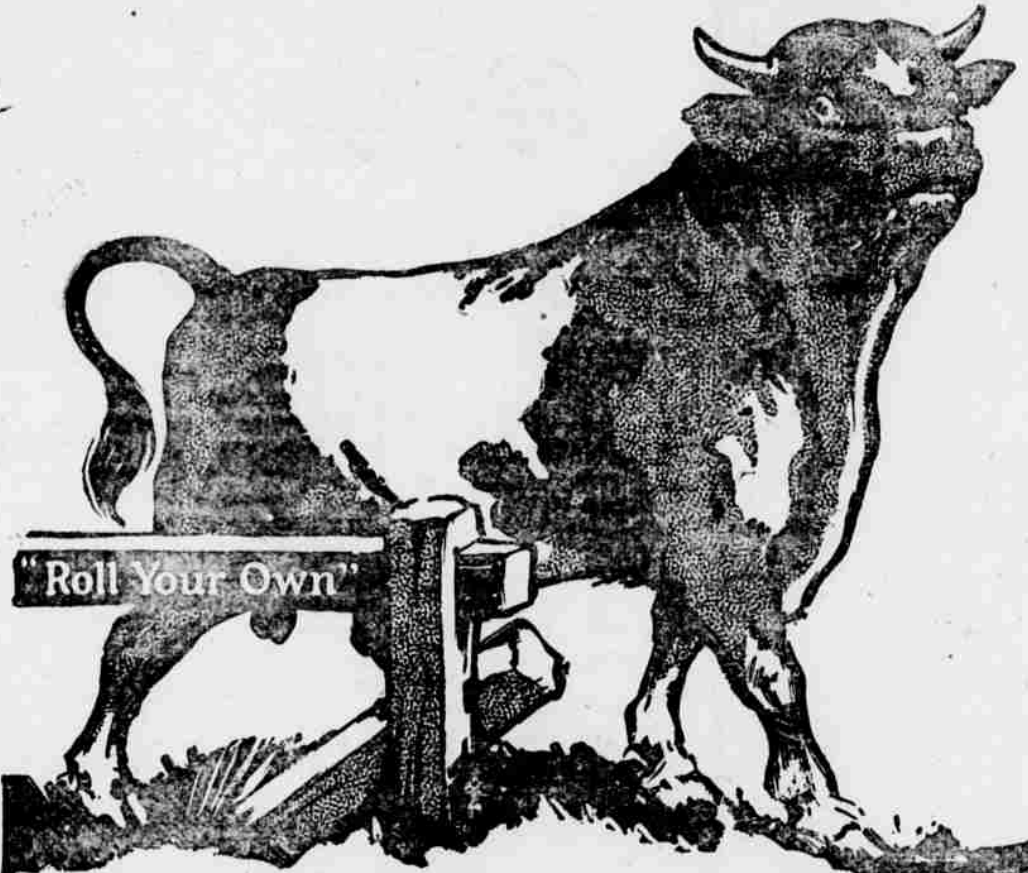


# Ford

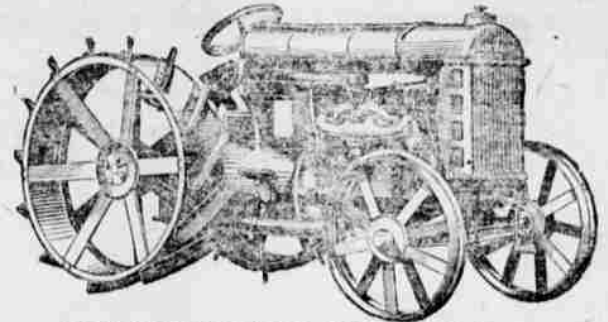

### SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Lincoln County

Laydus R. Hill, Plaintiff,

To George E. Quiggle and Fannie E. Quiggle, his wife, C. F. Pedersen and Susan Pedersen, his wife, Alex McRae and Mrs. Alex McRae, his wife, the above named defendants:

In the Name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons to-wit: On or before the 14th day of June, 1920, and if you fail so to answer for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to said Court and take a decree against you for the relief demanded and prayed for in said complaint, viz:

First: For a judgment against defendants, George E. Quiggle, Fannie Quiggle, Alex McRae and Mrs. Alex McRae, in the sum of \$5300.00 together with interest thereon from Dec. 1st 1911, at the rate of 5 per cent per annum until paid; for the sum of \$300.00 attorney's fees in said suit, and for taxes and interest thereon as in said complaint set forth and prayed for, and for his costs and disbursements of said suit.

Secondly: That the usual decree in foreclosure may be made for the sale of the mortgaged premises in said complaint described according to law and the practice of said court; that the proceeds thereof may be applied in payment of said judgment, attorney's fees and costs and disbursements as aforesaid, and cost of said sale and accruing costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary for such purposes; that the mortgage upon said premises, together with all encumbrances, mortgages or lien holders or other-

wise, be forever barred and foreclosed of all right, title, lien, claim interest, estate, or equity of redemption in and to said mortgaged premises and the whole thereof, excepting redemption as by law provided.

Fourthly: That the sheriff of Lincoln County, Oregon, execute a deed to the purchaser of said premises at said sale and that said plaintiff or any other party to this suit may become a purchaser at said sale of said premises, and that the purchaser thereof be in lawful possession of said premises on the production of the Sheriff's certificate of sale therefor, and if such that whatever interest said defendants C. F. Pedersen and Susan Pedersen, his wife may have in said mortgaged premises, be adjudged and decreed to be subsequent and subject to plaintiff's said mortgage lien thereon.

Thirdly: That the defendants and all persons claiming under them either of them subsequent to the execution and recording of said plaintiff's said mortgage, be refused then the said sheriff shall put said purchaser in possession of the whole said premises. That said mortgaged premises are described as follows, to-wit: The south 1/2 of the Southwest 1/4 of section 28, Township 13 South, Range 11 West of the Willamette Meridian in Lincoln County, Oregon, and containing 80 acres.
