REGARDING EXPERTS REPORT

The Leader publishes this week that part of the experts report dealing with the County Treasurer's office and some correspondence dealing with the report. We had this for publication last week, but were unable to do so on account of space. We ask our readers to go over this report and correspondence carefully that they may see for themselves how utterly absurd and unfair was the Yaquina Bay News' article. The report shows the Treasurer to be \$1.47 long, and the error mentioned in the Crandall letter was \$5,358.49, not \$11,000.00. All of the money belonging to the county was in the bank drawing 2 per cent for the county, and this error in no way affected the county nor the interest due the county, it simply being a mistake in a fund balance, and not affecting the general cash of the treasurer. The county has no outstanding warrants drawing interest and therefore could not in any manner lose anything by a clerical error of this kind. The whole matter is absurd and ridiculous and the only reason the Leader gives it space is that in justice to the county treasurer, the public should know the facts.

STILL GOING UP

The price of news print, like the price of sugar, is still going up. Before the war print paper sold at about 3 cents per pound. When the war ended it was selling at about 7 cents a pound. The latest quotation is 12 cents with a prediction that it will go higher.

We raised our rates 30 per cent the first of the year, the price of paper is up 400 per cent. It is easy to figure just how rich country newspaper editors will get at this rate.

One Dakota weekly raised its price from \$1.50 to \$2.00 and has just recently again raised from \$2.00 to \$5.00. A Montana weekly is nearly as bad, having just boosted its price to \$4.00 per year. The Saturday Evening Post has adopted a plan of deferred entry, owing to the shortage of paper, that is, subscriptions sent in now will not be started until their issue of August 7th, their plan being to defer all subscriptions about two months. The subscriber's money will be refunded in case they do not wish to wait the two months. The Post also raised its price to \$2.50 per year. One Southern paper is printing its issues on wall paper, while another is using wrapping paper.

The Leader does not contemplate another raise just at present, but will make no promises for the future. However, we cannot carry subscribers after their time has expired, so if you want to receive the paper, please renew at once when we send you notice that your subscriptions has expired, otherwise we will be forced to take your name from our list.
