SILETZ

IN MEMORY—Hans Madison was born in Denmark June 23d, 1844 and died in Siletz June 20, 1920, aged 75 years, 11 months and 13 days. Was educated in Denmark and united with the Lutheran church when a young man. He came to California when 17 years old and made that state his home until four years ago when he came to Siletz, Oregon. A large portion of his early life was spent at sea, he having visited all the principal ports of the world. He made many trips around Cape Horn and to China. He joined the I.O.O.F. lodge at Selma, California, in 1871, and remained a faithful member of the same until his death. A. T. Peterson and Wm. Graham, members of Toledo lodge I.O.O.F., visited him during his illness and he requested of them should he die he wanted the Odd Fellows to conduct his funeral. This promise was faithfully carried out. Mr. Sorenson was also a member of Siletz Valley Grange was one of its officers and always took an active part in the work of the Grange as long as his health would permit. By his kind disposition and fraternal spirit he made many friends here in Siletz. His funeral was well attended by friends, Odd Fellows and Grangers. The services at the church were conducted by Rev. Walter Ross and at the cemetery by the Odd Fellows from the Toledo lodge some twelve or fifteen in number. R. H. Howell and Hans Larson read the beautiful ritualistic service of the Order. Some beautiful wreaths, a cross and a bower of flowers were placed upon the grave by friends and members of the two Orders of which deceased belonged. The remains were laid to rest in the beautiful River View Cemetery near the Klamath grade. This makes the fourth burial in this cemetery which was established a little more than a year ago.

The house warming dance given Saturday night at the Recreation hall was a success in every way. The music was furnished by the Jansen Orchestra. Charlie Hyde took part in the orchestra for the evening and this added much to the beauty and charm of the music. The hall was crowded—some fifty couples of merry dancers. Ice cream was served and a midnight supper was given by Mrs. Grant King. People came from Taft, Millport, Lower and Upper Farm and Toledo. It was a jolly good time. The best of order prevailed and this of course was to the credit of the manager. It continues to rain and while it does this the antres are laid up and is a great saving of gas besides it benefits the farmer as he will need no more irrigation to make good crops. LIVESTOCK SALE

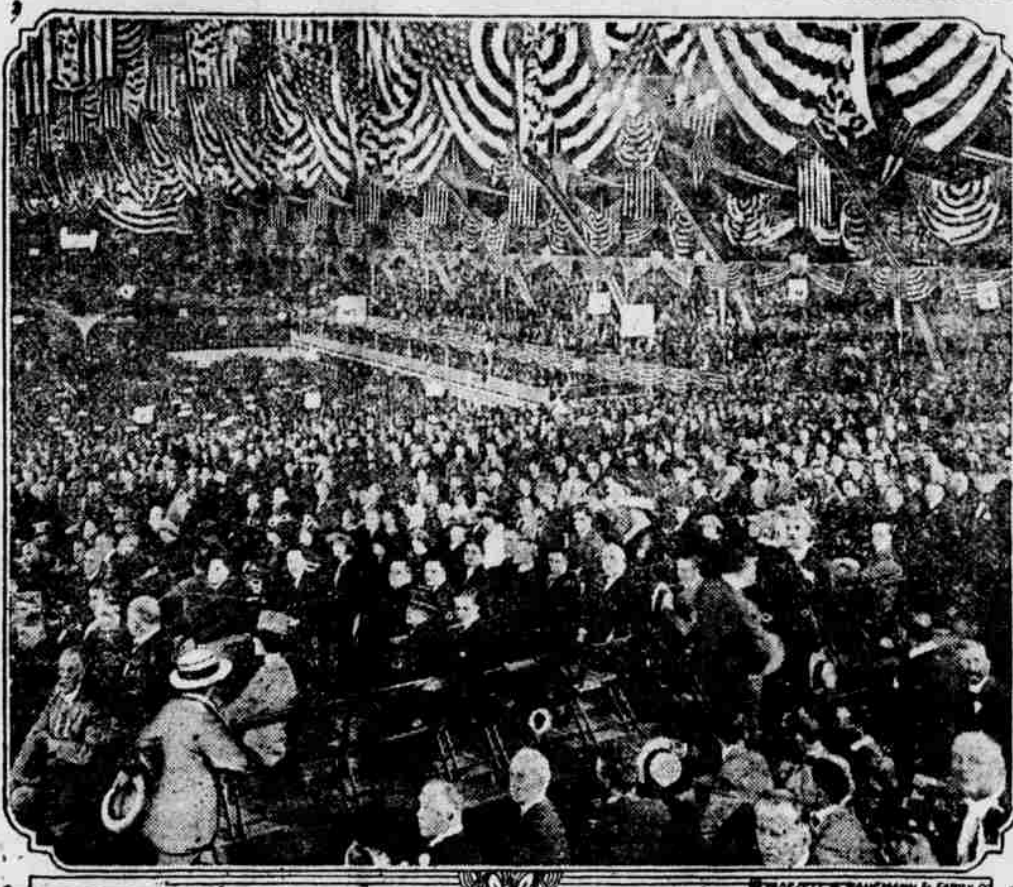

The sale list includes fifty-three head of cattle, sixty head of hogs and one bay mare.

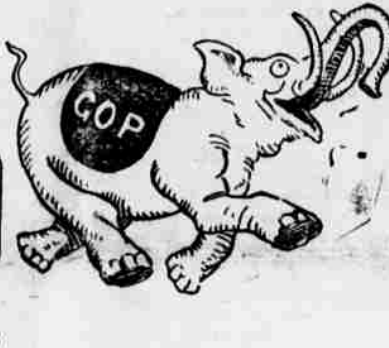

LADIES—REMAKE YOUR OLD HATS

Millinery Extension Schools at Toledo, June 21st and 22nd; Newport 23rd and 24th; and Siletz 25th and 26th.

How to remake the old hat is every woman's problem. In order to assist in this solution, Miss Doolittle of the Oregon Agricultural College has been scheduled by the County Agent for a two days' demonstration as above indicated.

Arrangements for the Toledo school are being made under the joint auspices of the Toledo Civic Club, and the Women's Work Committees of the Grange and the Farm Bureau.

Miss Doolittle carries a supply of wire, buckram, shellac and other materials of that sort which are needed. Women attending should understand that they are expected to bring the old hats and old trimmings, no matter how dirty or faded they are. They should also bring scraps of silk or ribbon which can be used in making trimmings or facings. Very small scraps can be used in this way. Pieces of old silk or georgette waists can be dyed and used. In fact it would be better if each woman brought material of that sort, whether she could see the possibility of using it or not.
