J. W. WIEDMAN LAID TO REST

(Wash., Kelsonian) The funeral of John William Wiedman, who passed away suddenly at his home here Wednesday was conducted this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Baptist church. Rev. J. O. Bovee, pastor of the Baptist Church, conducted the service. Interment was in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Wiedman was a native of Wurttemberg, Germany, where he was born January 22, 1849, being in his 72nd year at the time of his demise. He came to the United States in March, 1867, landing in New York. From there he went to California, where he lived for a number of years.

He took out his first Naturalization papers in 1868, and was granted full citizenship in 1874. From California he moved to Newberg, in Yamhill county, Oregon. He was united in marriage to Miss Martha Ellen Griffin May 7th, 1879.

The union proved a most happy one, and the grief stricken wife and companion of more than fifty-one years is left to mourn his loss. Five or six children also survive. They are Mrs. Jos. A. Schaffer of this city; Mrs. S. H. Smith of Newport, Or.; Louis Wiedman of Waldport, Or.; Archie Wiedman of Tillamook, Or.; and Ervin Wiedman of Salem, Or. Mr. Wiedman sold his farm near Waldport, Oregon, about a year ago, and moved to Kelso to reside, purchasing the P. E. Day residence.
