Andrew Porter with a crew of men is now engaged in surveying and locating a county road on the north side of Siletz river to Millport a distance of six or seven miles. The road is finally to be continued to Taft, a distance of eight or ten miles farther, so the people of that part of the county that have been isolated so long will have a chance to get to the county seat and also connect with the railroad and will also have access to the markets of the world through this inland highway. Nothing could be done that would aid in developing and settling up this fine section of the county like the building of that road would do. Newport has now a fairly good road running up the coast to Millport, a distance of 24 miles. A car can go that distance now in about one hour and a half. The scenery along this route following the sea coast is unsurpassed for grandeur and natural beauty. Some of the rock bound shore along this road rises to the height of a hundred feet with perpendicular walls and when the swells roll in and break during a great storm the spray will rise a hundred feet and with the rays of the sun shining thru this gives the seven colors presenting a most delightful sight. Lincoln county is not lacking in beautiful scenery, neither is she lacking in all that goes to make for health, wealth and happiness when properly developed. Lincoln county will get her share of the tourist travel when roads are built so people can get in here. Millions of dollars are spent every year by tourists going abroad for health and pleasure when Oregon with her lofty mountains, green forests and towering peaks, rushing rivers, roaring waterfalls, sparkling springs of pure water gushing from her mountain sides presents a picture unsurpassed in beauty of scenery. As time goes on the tourist travel will come to Oregon and to Lincoln county because of her fine climate, health, beauty and natural attractions. We should not be discontented and restless but work and wait and time will bring these to pass. The road work under the supervision of Mr. Marvin seems to be well organized and everyone doing county work is expected to put in honest time and not soldier on the taxpayer who foot the bills. The harbor work at Newport is going on satisfactorily and it is said more rock is being put in the South Jetty under the supervision of the Port Commissioners than would have been done under the supervision of the Government. It is the plan now to get the South Jetty so fully completed as to stand the storms of winter.
