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SILETZ

Ralph Hamar, smiling, suave and contented; ask him what is up and he will tell you—at our home on July 16th, a bouncing ten pound baby boy was born, mother and baby both doing well. Mr. Hamar is one of the prosperous dairy farmers on the Siletz.

Most of the townspeople went to the woods Sunday to take a day of recreation and pleasure.

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Hall, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Robinson, and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Larsen, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Trowbridge and Arthur Bensell and family motored to what is known as the A. C. Crawford home-stead Saturday evening and camped over night. It seems they had a fine lot of fun around the campfire. They illuminated the wild woods with fire works and told so many bear stories that it made the hair stand on some of their heads and Mrs. Trowbridge got so worked up that she sat up all night to watch for bear. She saw at the dark hour of midnight a civit cat prowling around trying to get something to eat. Mrs. T. feeling that danger was near woke up a cat told her there was no danger. Mrs. Trowbridge was not used to being in the wildwoods and this was the means of her infection. Mrs. Trowbridge is a daughter of Dr. M. F. Clausius who was physician here for thirteen years and died at his post here some five years ago. He was a good physician, cool competent, and master of himself. It is said of him that on his dying bed he counted each beat of the pulse till he became unconscious and passed away. Mrs. Trowbridge had never visited the Agency before. The party fished and played and strolled and had a good time but being Sunday the fish did not bite. They had a swell dinner and came home feeling fine after their day and night of outing. Mr. and Mrs. Trowbridge are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Bensell while at Siletz. The Trowbridges live at Seattle.

Another party took an outing Sunday but they went up the Siletz river instead of down. This party was comprised of the following families: Mr. and Mrs. Giles Olin, Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Parrish and Mr. and Mrs. Roy Chandler. This party motored to the falls on Rock Creek about twelve miles from the Agency. This place is said to be a beautiful camping ground and a fine place to angle for the speckled trout. A good many fish are caught here. The falls are about eight feet high and present a beautiful appearance as the waters tumble over the rocks to seek its level below. This party had a swell time, a good dinner and came home feeling a hundred per cent better than they did when they left home in the morning.

Mrs. James Watson and Mrs. Austin Altree left for their home Sunday but will stop over at Nortons to visit their brother, Mr. Bryant. A slight mistake crept into our communication last week that should be corrected. In speaking of Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Altree visiting their parents it should have been their brother, Joseph Bryant. These ladies' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Perman Bryant have been dead a good many years. Mrs. Watson said her parents with a number of others, she mentioned Peter Meads and family, A. J. Porter and family, James Hamar and family and Charles McLane settled on the Yaquina river in the fall and winter of 1865 and that part of the reservation was opened for settlement in 1866 when they took their homesteads. It is useless now to recount the hardships these pioneers went through to open trails, build roads and establish homes at that early date and as a result their children and others enjoy the fruits their labors brought forth while their parents, God bless their memories, have passed over the "Great Divide" to solve the mysteries of the Great Unknown, may they rest in peace. Mrs. Watson said at that early date the hills and mountains along Yaquina river were almost bare of trees and vegetation but the bodies of thousands of charred trees stood as silent sentinels of the great fire that had passed through the country some years before—about 1845. Mrs. Watson said she could see from their door almost any morning or evening fifteen or twenty elk or deer feeding on the hills undisturbed and often the black bear would come to their kitchen door looking for something to eat. But alas these days have passed away and go has most of the game and the plain, honest, brave, hospitable pioneers have gone the same trail.

The tourist travel to Siletz has greatly increased this year. The auto travel to Siletz will average 25 or 30 cars each week.

CENSUS REPORT FOR LINCOLN COUNTY

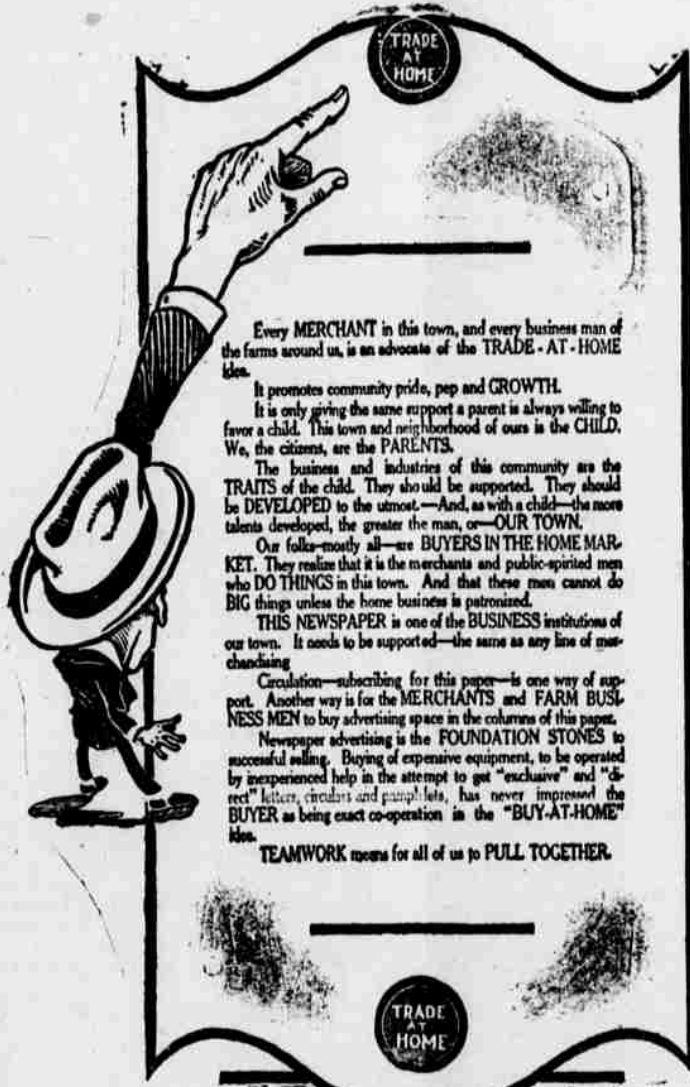
We give herewith preliminary announcement of population for Lincoln County, as shown by the fourteenth census. These figures are all subject to correction.

We give the population of the county as a whole, the population of each city in the county, and the population of each voting precinct. The population of the county as a whole has increased 497 or 8.1 per cent. The report would indicate that many of the precincts have decreased in population, but in reality this is not true as most of the decreases noted were brought about by taking parts from a number of the larger precincts and forming new precincts. So while the population is less in some of the precincts we now have more precincts.

According to the figures given out by the census bureau, Toledo now ranks as the largest city in Lincoln county, with a population of 678, having increased 137 or 25.3 per cent.

DORIS ALLEN KILLED AT ROBERTS SAWMILL

Little Doris, the three year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Allen was instantly killed this noon at the Roberts sawmill, where she had gone in company with her mother and a nurse, to meet Mr. Allen who is employed at the mill. The accident occurred just as the noon whistle blew. It seems that the little girl left the side of her mother and walked over to a pile of ties that was about as high as her head, and tried to climb up on them. As soon as she pulled up on them the pile fell over on top of her, the back of her head striking on a tie as she fell, and the pile of ties falling on top of her, killing her instantly. The mother and nurse, as well as men from the mill, at once ran to render her aid, but she was dead.

Doris was a pretty little flaxen haired Miss who quickly won her way to the hearts of all who knew her, and the blow of her tragic death falls doubly hard on the mother who just recently returned from the hospital where she underwent an operation, and is still under the care of a nurse.

The heartfelt sympathy of the people of Toledo goes out to the sorrowing family in their sad bereavement.

NEED OF BRIDGE FELT

Cook brothers of Ona who were in the city Monday after the machinery for their new shingle mill, keenly realized the need of a bridge across the Yaquina here. As it was they had to ferry the truck across to Toledo, then load the machinery on the truck, ferry the truck back across the river and take it to Ona, repeating this performance for each load. They estimated that it would cost in the neighborhood of \$50 more to get the machinery to its destination than it would have had there been a bridge here, to say nothing of the extra delay incurred.
