H. H. Cook and son have just received the machinery for their sawmill on Elk Horn Creek.

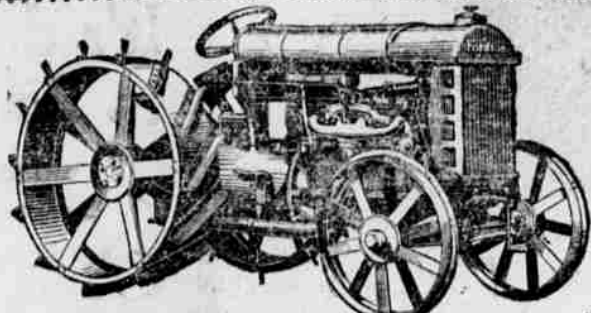
Mrs. C. W. Harding and children are visiting Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Avery on their homestead this week.
