Taking all things into consideration they have been very fortunate that there has been no worse accidents on this road." We regret very much that your South Beach correspondent should have seen fit to put the above into your paper, as it is very misleading to parties not knowing the actual conditions, we feel that the public should be set right in the matter. We admit there is danger on this road, but as there are no heavy trains, or fast time made; the danger is very slight, compared with the general conditions in other places, the road is in very good condition for the light traffic on it. Your correspondent does not state the nature of the accident that John Walker met with, after making careful inquiry we are only able to locate one accident that he has had that was slight or otherwise, and while this one might appear slight to the public in general it no doubt was a serious one for John, according to the best information we can obtain the accident happened as follows, John was speeding his trusty Ford along at the usual high speed of ten miles an hour which is made on the good level road, with his accurate knowledge of the road, with his ever keen sight and strict attention he suddenly slowed down to cross the high trestle, and the lady passenger by his side being of the same apparent nature as the correspondent suddenly saw how near they were to an awful disaster which MIGHT happen, the rails are only four inches wide, and should the Ford jump the rails at this high trestle then jump the guard rail there would be nothing to prevent it leaping fifty feet down into this awful gulch and killing all the passengers, so any one can see this was very NEAR, only

four inches (the width of the rail) from an awful accident, and this happens at least twice every day and still no one is hurt, then the trestle was crossed and the Ford shot ahead over the good road at her usual speed, but John's accident was like this; when the lady passenger saw the awful danger in her imagination she suddenly lurched and John's attention was momentarily taken from his engine by the awful disaster on his corn patch, which left him with a serious pain in his perambulator.

TOLEDO CANNERY TO START CANNING AT ONCE

(Farm Bureau News)

H. A. Graves, proprietor of the Toledo Canning Company, arrived in Toledo this week, and will start canning operations as soon as blackberries are available. He does not plan to can string beans this year.

"The market conditions are anything but favorable for the canneryman," says Mr. Graves. Previously the canneryman has sold his entire output before the season opened. This year, Mr. Graves informs us, there is no future buying and it is a gamble as to what he will be able to dispose of his season's pack for. Mr. Graves indicates that most of the blackberries packed last year were sold at a loss, or at least without any profit to the cannery.

At a recent meeting of the cannerymen it was agreed that the price to be paid for blackberries this year would be six cents. This apparent reduction in price does not mean a lessening in the use of the Evergreen blackberry but is due entirely to the inability of Oregon cannerymen to contract or sell the coming season's pack. Mr. Graves says that he is not even sure that he can handle the six cent berry at a profit, but is going to take the chance. Our advice to berry pickers is—Pick all you can at six cents; even though it is not as good as the eight cent berry of last year it beats the three cent berry of two years ago.

BIG ELK FAIR, SEPTEMBER 17 AND 18

The Big Elk Fair, always one of the biggest little fairs held on the coast is scheduled for September 17 and 18. New features are planned this year, possibly including Bronco Busting and Wild Steer roping. I. R. Payne is President and May C. Grant Secretary. An invitation is extended to the people of the County to attend, and when it is realized that this invitation includes a free meal ticket Fair Day—To one of those famous dinners, we conclude—"enuff sed."

LIVESTOCK AUCTIONS AT COUNTY FAIR

(Farm Bureau News)

Arrangements have already been made to hold on "Dairy Day" a pure-bred Holstein sale. The entire pure-bred herd of the late D. B. Ramsdell of Elk City will be consigned and sold. The herd is rich in the blood of the De Kols, Korndyke, Cornucopia, Segis, Alenra, Inka, Pontiac, and other popular and profitable lines of breeding. No official testing was carried on by Mr. Ramsdell, due to the fact that no official testing association was available. In the offering is a three year old herd sire, an eight month old bull calf, and two younger bulls, one young heifer calf and several yearlings, and the remainder mature cows from two to seven years old.

Any parties desiring further information may secure same by writing the County Agent. Pedigrees and Herd Book Records may be seen at the office. The cattle may be seen at the D. B. Ramsdell farm above Elk City until September 15th, after which time they will be at the County Fair Grounds.

It is possible also that the Jersey men will arrange a pure bred sale.

On "Goat Day" a special sale of Angora and Milk Goats will be held, consignments being arranged for from out State points as well as from the County.

All livestock, including poultry, may be entered subject to sale in the auction ring. A licensed auctioneer will be in attendance.

From present indications, the Livestock Show will be a "dandy" this year.
